

Who We Are



Director: Mrs. Valerie Jackson - Valerie Jackson has more than twenty-four years in federal service, principally as a United States Marine. Before coming to the Krulak Center in July, she was an arbitrator in Dallas, Texas. Her areas of expertise include conflict management and resolution, civil-military operations, international relations, and strategic studies. She has led and commanded Marine units throughout her career, and has spent time as an instructor at the Marine Corps Civil Military Operations School and as the senior editor and field historian for the Marine Corps History Division. She is married to LtCol Chris Jackson, USMC, retired, and together they are the proud parents of daughters Madeline, Elizabeth and Lia.

Deputy Director: LtCol Matthew Chambliss - An artillery officer by primary MOS, at MCU he led the Red Team in challenging assumptions and playing devil's advocate during various student exercises. After his return from Iraq in support of Operation Inherent Resolve in September 2018, he assumed duties as the Deputy Director.

IO Cell: Technical Information Operations Officer: Maj Rob Arant - Major Arant is a graduate of NPS's Information Warfare Systems Engineering masters program. Major Arant is an OIE SME who teaches OIE classes to faculty and students and works in liaison with MCIOC and DC I for MCU school exercise and classroom support. Major Arant served as the Deputy Director from July 2016 until LtCol Chambliss' arrival in September 2018.

Operations Officer: Maj Tim Riemann - Major Riemann is an AAV officer by MOS. After spending the last year as the MCCDC Staff Secretary, he is now fulfilling his duties as the Operations Officer of the Brute Krulak Center. He is responsible for all the day-to-day activities that take part in the Center as well as assisting in the coordination of all Bren Chair events, which provide support to the Marine Corps University and its students.

Professor, Energy Studies: Dr. Michael Baskin - As the Prof. of Energy Studies, works with all MCU schools and focus on three connected yet distinct areas of energy security, operational energy, and innovation. Also connects into the entrepreneurship and defense innovation space and is capable of delivering expertise in the use of negotiation by military leaders.

Bren Chair for Creative Problem Solving: Dr. Jeb Nadaner - Dr. Nadaner possesses a record of creativity and innovation in commerce and industry, and in federal service. He served as the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Partnership Strategy and Stability Operations. At Lockheed Martin, he led advanced technology research and development portfolios and restructuring programs as Vice President of Engineering & Technology, and before that was Director of Business Development and Strategy.

Bren Chair for Armed Politics: Dr. Brandon Valeriano - Serves as a Senior Fellow in cyber security for the Niskanen Center in Washington D.C. He recently provided testimony in front of both the United States Senate and the Parliament of the United Kingdom on the dynamics of modern conflict. In his spare professional time, he focuses on engaging policy-makers and government officials on the changing character of war.






Who We Are

Bren Chair for Cyber Security and Conflict: Mr. J. D. Work - Mr. Work directed international research programs for the Cyber Conflict Documentation Project, a nonpartisan and apolitical nonprofit academic collaboration that seeks to provide insight into the emerging strategic issues, economic consequences, and technology implications created by hostilities in the virtual domain. Mr. Work has over 20 years of experience addressing complex transnational issues and asymmetric threats, and since 2001, he has developed and taught analytic and other tradecraft courses at a number of academic institutions and US government agencies.

Bren Chair for Great Powers Competition: Dr. Chris Harmon - Christopher C. Harmon has directed academics for two Department of Defense overseas programs for foreign professionals concerned with terrorism and counterterrorism. Here, at Command & Staff College, he managed core courses on "Strategy and Policy" and "Theory and Nature of War" while teaching for many years as a professor of international relations. Dr. Harmon, lead editor or author of six books, has written essays for the geopolitics journal Orbis and other periodicals including Strategic Studies Quarterly and Oxford Bibliographies.

Bren Chair of Non-Western Strategic Thought: Dr. Christopher Yung - Dr. Yung is part of the China analytical community conducting current research and analysis of China's strategic trajectory. He serves as MCU's window into the current scholarship related to China and Asia, particularly that research having to do with strategic and military issues.

Bren Chair for Strategic Communications: Mr. Donald Bishop - Mr. Bishop was a Foreign Service Officer - first in the U.S. Information Agency and then in the Department of State - for 31 years. Specializing in Public Diplomacy, political-military affairs, and East Asia, he attained the rank of Minister-Counselor in the career service. Areas of Interest: Strategic communication, Public Diplomacy, Public Affairs, International Broadcasting, Information warfare, Psychological Operations, The Four Freedoms, Religious Liberty, The China-Burma-India Theater in World War II, The U.S. in World War I, The Wars of America.



INTERESTING FACT: The Brute Krulak Center logo on the top right corner of this newsletter encompasses a light bulb. The light bulb symbolizes both innovation, the "Eureka" moment, and failure, in order for innovation to succeed one must accept failure along the way. "In the period from 1878 to 1880 Edison and his associates worked on at least three thousand different theories to develop an efficient incandescent lamp." Before Edison had perfected his light bulb, he had "...tested no fewer than 6,000

It took Thomas Edison nearly two years to test thousands of possible light bulb configurations to find the light bulb we know and use today. His work revolutionized the light bulb and how the world lit up their homes and cities at night, and it is a reminder that innovation requires persistence, acceptance of failure, and determination.

October 2018

On October 25th, the Krulak Center held a Cyber/ OIE Simulation Wargame. The simulation consisted of 36 students from CSC and EWS represented as "players" as well as observers from SAW, the Deputy Commandant of Information (DCI) office, and the Marine Corps Information Operations Center (MCIOC). The simulation was led by **Dr. Benjamin Jensen**, Professor CSC, and **Mr. J.D. Work**, Bren Chair for Cyber Security and Conflict. This event was the first large scale event to use the Center's collaboration spaces in the GRC.

October 2018 - Energy & Innovation Scholars Program

From October 11th to October 14th, the inaugural MCU Energy & Innovation Scholars Program (E&ISP) conducted a national field trip to the National Renewable Energy Laboratory (NREL) (Dept of Energy), Rocky Mountain Institute (RMI), and Defense Entrepreneurs Forum (DEF) in the Denver, CO region. The trip exceeded student and faculty expectations. As an initial pilot, the E&ISP is open to students from multiple MCU schools and colleges, both non-resident and resident, and offers enormous opportunity for the MCU enterprise.

SEPTEMBER – Mr. J.D. Work delivered the presentation "Warning intelligence and the countering mission in cyber operations under conditions of persistent engagement" at the 2018 Intelligence & Cybersecurity Conference. He also published the article "Cyber Civil-Military Relations: Balancing Interests On The Digital Frontier," War on the Rocks, coauthored with Dr. Benjamin Jensen.

> Dr. Christopher Yung, Bren Chair of Non-Western Strategic Thought, started the new academic year with two lectures at the Expeditionary Warfare School (EWS) in August and early September. The first was an introduction to Sunzi, and the second was part of the EWS "4+1" lecture series on security challenges to the U.S. Dr. Yung's "4+1" lecture was a comprehensive presentation on China strategic, operational and tactical characteristics from ancient times to the present. The School of Advanced Warfighting (SAW) asked Dr. Yung to give a presentation to its class on "Future Warfare" issues related to China as the possible beginning of a mentor-student relationship in which Dr. Yung would guide the "Future Warfare" research efforts of its students. Also in September, Dr. Yung was invited by the U.S. Army to lecture a select group of officers and senior enlisted on China during its "Strategic Broadening Seminar" (SBS) held at the McConnell Center for Leadership at the University of Louisville.

Mr. Donald Bishop, Bren Chair for Strategic Communications, gave a presentation at Joint Special Operations University at MacDill AFB, participated in a panel on Information Operations at the DACOR Bacon Foundation, and gave two presentations on aftershocks of WWII in Asia at George Mason University.

Mr. Bishop also attended the 2018 conference of the International Commission on Military History in Jerusalem. The theme of the conference was ""The Creation of New States and Collapse of Old Empires in the XXth Century." The conference schedule and a pre-tour included visits to museums, army and navy bases, battlefields, and kibbutzes -- in northern Israel, the Golan Heights, Tel Aviv, and Jerusalem.
