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

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Introduction

The list which follows is intended to represent a cross section of the more generally available books and periodicals related to the history of the United States Marine Corps. To provide the greatest possible value to the largest number of researchers and writers, broad criteria for selection of items to be included have been utilized. Inclusion of any given title does not, therefore, constitute Marine Corps acceptance or endorsement of an author's views, conclusions, or indeed, complete historical accuracy. By the same token, the annotation supplied is in the nature of description of the contents of books and articles rather than a critical evaluation.

The list is organized chronologically by period. For the convenience of the user, an author index is included along with a biography subject listing.

The annotation "notes" indicates that the publication is documented as to research sources; "bibliog" indicates that a bibliography of research materials is appended. The inclusion of illustrations and portraits is indicated by "illus" and "ports."

Personal account of recruit training at Parris Island, S. C. early in World War II.

16. Cordelia Drexel Biddle, as told to Kyle Crichton. My Philadelphia Father. Garden City, New York: Doubleday, 1955. 256 pp. illus.

This biography of Colonel A. J. Drexel Biddle by his daughter gives an interesting insight into the Marine officer responsible for many of the innovations in the methods of bayonet fighting by Marines. The reasons for Colonel Biddle's proficiency in bayonet fighting and his influence upon bayonet fighting by Marines are clearly set forth.

A biography of Brigadier General Evans F. Carlson, USMC, with emphasis on his part in organizing and leading the 2d Marine Raider Battalion in World War II. Included are the experiences of Carlson as a guerrilla with the Chinese from whom he learned much of value later incorporated into the methods of his raider battalion.

A journalistic account containing several personal sketches of Marines in combat with particular emphasis on Belleau Wood and Blanc Mont.

Autobiography of a Marine ace and Medal of Honor recipient encompassing his service with Marine Fighter Squadron 214 (the "Black Sheep") in the Solomons and his experiences as a prisoner of war.

Former enlisted Marine's account of the fall of Guam, 1941, and imprisonment in the Zentsuji and Osaka No. 1 prisoner of war camps in Japan, 1941-1945.

A short biography of General A. A. Vandegrift, 18th Commandant of the Marine Corps.

Former enlisted Marine's account of training at Parris Island, South Carolina, Sep-Dec 1941, and service as an artilleryman with the 11th Marines on Guadalcanal, Aug-Dec 1942.

The story of a horse in Korea and the Marines who adopted her.

About the author's experiences on board a transport en route to the South Pacific and service as a ground officer with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing on Guadalcanal, 1942-1943.

A very readable account of the life of one of the heroes of the Barbary Wars. Includes accounts of Marine Lieutenant O'Bannon's part in the march across the North African desert to attack Derna on the shores of Tripoli.

Entries from the personal journal of the Army general who commanded the 4th Brigade of Marines, May-July 1918, and led it in the Belleau Wood and Soissons operations.

The wartime letters of an officer of Georgia troops and of the CSMC. Lieutenant Graves served in the CSS Savannah and on the Savannah station of the CSN. This is the only published collection of the three known groups of letters from CSMC officers.

Autobiographical account of the author's service with the 4th Marines on Corregidor, his experiences as a prisoner of war, his escape from the Davao prison camp (in company with Lieutenant Colonel William E. Dyess, USA, among others), his service with Filipino guerrillas on Mindanao, and eventual evacuation to Australia.

Autobiography of the 13th Commandant with special attention to the Corps in World War I and the 1920s.
