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### SECTION 2

### Narrative Summary

### Command, Operations, and Training

Regimental Combat Team 2 (RCT-2) received a Be Prepared to Deploy (BPTD) order on 19 Dec 2002, embarked amphibious shipping 3-15 January 2003 and deployed to Kuwait during January and early February 2003 in support of Operation ENDURING FREEDOM. The major subordinate units in the task organization for Regimental Combat Team 2, included: Headquarters Company, Second Marines; 1<sup>st,</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Battalions, Second Marines; 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, Eight Marines, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, 10<sup>th</sup> Marines; Company A, 2<sup>nd</sup> Reconnaissance Battalion; Company C, 2<sup>nd</sup> Light Armor Reconnaissance (LAR) Battalion; Company A, 8<sup>th</sup> Tank Battalion; Company A, 2<sup>nd</sup> Amphibious Assault Battalion; Company A, 2<sup>nd</sup> Combat Engineer Battalion. Additionally, RCT-2 was reinforced by detachments from Headquarters Battalion, 2nd Marine Division and US Army Psychological Operations Teams. RCT-2 was embarked on seven amphibious ships with Commander of Troops (COT) and Team Embark Officer (TEO) responsibilities for six of the seven ships. The Commanding Officer of RCT-2, Col Ronald L. Bailey was embarked on the USS Bataan. The Commanding Officers of the subordinate battalions were embarked as follows:

Commanding Officer of 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, Second Marines, LtCol Ricky Grabowski, was embarked on the USS Ponce. Commanding Officer of 3rd Battalion, Second Marines, LtCol Paul Dunahoe, was embarked on the USS Kearsarge. Commanding Officer of 2nd Battalion, Eight Marines, LtCol Royal Mortenson, was embarked on the USS Siapan. Commanding Officer of 1st Battalion, Tenth Marines, LtCol Glenn Starnes, was embarked on the USS Gunston Hall.

RCT-2 arrived and off loaded amphibious shipping between 15-30 February 2003 at Kuwait Naval Base (KNB) (Grid Coordinate 39RTM34709603), 60KM south of Kuwait City. Upon arrival in theater, RCT-2 was organized for combat and integrated with the equipment that arrived on civilian contracted 'black-bottom' shiping. The maneuver elements of RCT-2 were organized into one mechanized battalion, two motorized battalions and one LAR Company supported by one battalion of artillery. From mid-February through late March, RCT-2 lived at Camp Shoup (Grid Coordinate 38RQT506745) approximately 75 KM Northwest of Kuwait City. While at Camp Shoup RCT-2 conducted planning and rehearsals in preparation for Operation IRAQI FREEDOM. CAMP SHOUP



Between 19-20 March RCT-2 departed Camp Shoup and moved to the Iraq/Kuwait Border in preparation for combat operations. RCT-2 crossed the line of departure with over 4,121 Marines and Sailors supported by over 700 vehicles including tanks, Amphibious Assault Vehicles (AAV), Light Armored Vehicles (LAV), and other pieces of rolling stock.

The summary of RCT-2's Combat Actions

## 19-20 March: Movement to the Iraq Border

On 20 March, RCT-2 moved from Camp Shoup to Tactical Assembly Area (TAA) Hawkins on the Kuwait/Iraq border. The movement was conducted in echelon, with units spaced 45 minutes apart. On 19 March, LAR led RCT-2 movement and established in TAA Hawkins. The Quartering Party left on the 19<sup>th</sup> and the main body moved on the morning of the 20<sup>th</sup>. The roads (Iron Horse Trail and The Log Road) were crowded with USMC and USA units. Heavy Equipment Transport (HET) was requested to move tanks and Combat Engineer Battalion (CEB) heavy equipment but did not arrive until after dark. All the Tanks and CEB's ACE support equipment had to be driven to the TAA. The RCT-2 Tactical Command Post (TAC CP) and A Co CEB were the last units to reach the TAA.

Company A(-), 2d CEB staged at TAA Hawkins on the night of 20 March. The company made up the nucleus of Task Force Sapper. Task Force Sapper was organized to conduct a deliberate breach into Iraq. Upon arrival at TAA Hawkins, a tank platoon from A Co,  $8^{th}$  Tanks and a Military Police detachment from Combat Service Support Battalion 22 attached to Task Force Sapper for the conduct of the breach. Charlie Company, 2d LAR Battalion served in direct support of TF Sapper to provide security during the breach.  $1^{st}$  Platoon, Alpha Company, 2d CEB was attached to  $1^{st}$  Battalion, 2d Marines and six Marines from  $4^{th}$  Platoon were attached to LAR to serve as Engineer Scouts.



## 21-22 March: Movement to Jalibah Airfield

On the morning of 21 March, RCT-2 conducted a breach of the obstacle belt arrayed along the Kuwati/Iraqi border. A total of 4 lanes were breached with 2 western lanes opening first (lanes 3 and 4) followed by 2 eastern lanes (lanes 1 and 2). RCT-2 moved through the breach lanes in prearranged sequence. The Limit of advance was established as the oil field at Al Luhays. All units moved to pre-planned positions by the day's end. On the morning of the 22<sup>nd</sup>, LAR and 1/2 began to move forward in anticipation of orders to move out to Jalibah. LAR moved as far as Phase Line (PL) 70, while 1/2 held their position adjacent to AL Luhays. In the early afternoon, Task Force Tarawa (TFT) ordered RCT-2 to move to pre-planned positions in vicinity of PL Queensland. This move continued until after sunset. After dark on the 22<sup>nd</sup> at approximately 1900Z, TFT conducted a quick verbal brief and RCT-2 was ordered to execute a relief in place (RIP) on a Highway 1 bridge, west of An Nasiriyah NLT 230130Z May 03.

RCT-2 was also ordered to disregard current plans for RIP on the east side of AN Nasiriyah, and BPT conduct an attack NLT 230400Z Mar 03 to seize the two bridges east of An Nasiriyah. (the Euphrates and Saddam Canal bridges). The RCT-2 CO verified with the CG TFT the necessity of executing this attack/RIP without pause. Immediately following this brief, RCT-2 issued verbal orders to execute the variations of the pre-planned FRAGO required to comply with TFT intentions. LAR, 3/2, and the TAC CP began movement to the Highway 1 bridge within 3 hours of the TFT brief conclusion. 1/2 1/10, 2/8, the Main CP commenced movement within 6 hours of TFT brief. The RCT-2 moved all day and night on the 22<sup>nd</sup>. Movement ceased only after the objective was secured on the evening of the 23<sup>rd</sup>.

# 22-23 March: RIP with 3<sup>rd</sup> ID and attack to seize east bridges in An Nasiriyah.

On March 22, C Company, 2nd LAR moved to it's zone north of Jalibah and tied into a screen-line with 2d LAR Battalion. LAR pushed out dismounted patrols and uncovered two ammo caches. At 2000 Zulu, LAR collapsed the screen-line to move and conduct relief in place with 3d Infantry Division (ID), which was complete at 0300 on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of March. C Company LAR cleared the zone around Highway 1 bridge where numerous ammo and arms caches were uncovered west of the bridge. At 2200 Zulu, 3<sup>rd</sup> platoon shot two enemy soldiers on the northwest side of the bridge when they attempted to probe our defensive position.

Following a the hazardous trip north in the southbound lanes of Route 1, LAR company completed the RIP with the United States Army Brigade 3-69 on the Highway 1 bridge west of An Nasiriyah. 3/2 occupied positions east of the bridge astride Route 8 blocking enemy egress from the city. That night 3/2 came under mortar fire from the east and engaged enemy forces attempting to traverse Route 8. Two enemy vehicles were destroyed and over 150 automatic weapons were captured. The TAC CP proceeded to link up with the Main CP southeast of An Nasiriyah. Meanwhile, the RCT Main CP, 1/2, 1/10, and 2/8 advance on the east side up Route 7 was receiving direct and indirect fires. The RCT was slowed as a result of encountering the survivors of the 507<sup>th</sup> Maintenance Co (USA) between the RCT and the enemy. Once the Army soldiers were evacuated, 1/2 seized the Euphrates and Saddam Canal bridges with mechanized companies. 2/8 moved up to the south side of the Euphrates river bridge and 1/2 consolidated north of the Saddam Canal bridge.

At 2400Z on the 22<sup>nd</sup>, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion commenced movement from the intersection of Routes 1 and 8 towards An Nasirivah. The battalion was formed in two columns. The first column proceeded directly across the intersection from the southern route. second column staged in the north and proceeded directly across Route 8 and from there took a side trail. The intent was for both columns to link up on the far side of the Route 1 & 8 interchange and then proceed North. The battalion's movement was complicated by the presence of many US Army supply vehicles on both the northern and southern routes. Despite this, both columns successfully passed through the interchange, linked up, and were in position at the 20 Northing along Route 7 at 02512 well in advance of the 0400Z NLT time that had been set by the RCT-2.

At 0300Z, RCT-2 directed the battalion to move north to the 22 Northing to allow the artillery batteries room to deploy. As this was occurring the battalion began receiving mortar fire from a position to the northeast. Simultaneously, Combined Anti Armor Team (CAAT)-1 began receiving small arms fire from buildings located to their east and west. Team Tank (A Co, 8<sup>th</sup> Tanks) also received direct fire and engaged the enemy. As Team Tank returned fire they encountered a US Army HMMWV with 3 Soldiers in it. The soldiers reported that they were from the 507th Maintenance Company. They reported that their convoy had been ambushed several kilometers to the north and that several wounded soldiers were pinned down by enemy fire and needed evacuation. Team Tank was directed to recover the soldiers while Team Mech (B/1/2 and A Co, 2<sup>nd</sup> AAV) assumed Team Tank's position along with CAAT 1 and engaged enemy forces adjacent to the road.

Following the successful recovery of soldiers from the 507<sup>th</sup> and the destruction of the enemy positions adjacent to the road the battalion continued movement north along the MSR with Company B leading. Team Tank and the tanks from Team Mech were now at the rear of the formation with the logistic trains due to a need to refuel after having moved to recover the soldiers of the 507<sup>th</sup> Maintenance Company. As CAAT 1 and Company B approached the Railroad Bridge two T-55 tanks were sited on the southern side of the bridge and subsequently destroyed by CAAT with TOW missile shots. An additional seven T-55's were also destroyed by a combination of TOW and Javelin missile shots in that same vicinity. The battalion then continued North and seized the southern bridge spanning the Euphrates River and the Northern bridge spanning the Saddam Canal. During this time period, all companies of the battalion were involved in significant engagements lasting several hours in three separate locations. Company A at the Euphrates bridge, Company B on the eastern side of An Nasiriyah within the city, and Company C at the Northern bridge spanning the Saddam Canal. Following the seizure of the objectives the battalion assumed a hasty defense on the north side of the Saddam Canal. 2/8 was ordered forward and fought over the same ground covered by 1/2 in order to relieve 1/2 of the southern bridge over the Euphrates.

## 24-29 March: Securing Nasiriyah

The Regimental CP was located in the trash dump area southeast of An Nasiriyah. On the  $24^{th}$  of March, the RCT-2 conducted a forward passage of lines (as the stationary unit) with RCT-1 (the moving unit). During this time the units of RCT-2 also expanded their area of influence and exploited intelligence found locally from various sources. Operations were conducted based on that intelligence.

From 24 March through 3 Apr 2003, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion focused on several tasks. First, ensuring security of the LOC and adjacent areas in order to facilitate the passage of follow-on forces from First MARDIV. Second, the battalion focused on clearing any additional enemy forces out of its sector. Third, the battalion's Civil Affairs Team worked with local leaders to identify critical areas requiring support.

On the  $24^{th}$ , the first order of business was to reposition forces to better accomplish our assigned tasks. Accordingly, A Co  $8^{th}$  Tanks, functioning as a Team Mech, established a blocking position oriented south towards An Nasiriyah. Companies A, C, & B were positioned in the vicinity of the "T" intersection north of Saddam Canal in order listed above from left to right. Throughout the day, the battalion was attacked from all sides by a mix of Fedayeen militia and uniformed soldiers and came under fire from enemy mortars and artillery. Other actions accomplished on the  $24^{th}$  were two logistics re-supply via CH-46 and six medivacs (mixed civilian, enemy, and friendly). EPW's and detainees were processed. Most significantly, a ground resupply run was made by the battalion's Logistic Train, escorted by 2d LAR Bn(-), that brought vital supplies to the fight.

On the 25<sup>th</sup>, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion conducted a Forward Passage of Lines (FPOL) with RCT-7 (also known as Inchon). Extensive coordination was conducted regarding procedures for the FPOL. Despite these efforts the, lead battalion, 1<sup>st</sup> Bn 4<sup>th</sup> Marines fired several thousand rounds of small arms at B/1/2 from a distance of less than 200 meters resulting in one casualty. Having accomplished its primary mission of securing the LOC and affecting the passage of lines the battalion then focused on expanding its influence throughout the sector. Among the final actions, 1st Battalion participated in the rescue of Army PFC Jessica Lynch on 1 and 2 April. Working in conjunction with Army Special Operation Forces, the battalion provided one tank platoon as part of the raid force and also stood up a company size reaction force with requisite command and control assets. Upon completion of this mission the battalion staged for movement and on 3 April departed An Nasiriyah heading for Ad Diwanyah

At 0200Z on 24 March, 3rd Battalion displaced to eastern An Nasiriyah to assist RCT-2 main effort, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion 2<sup>nd</sup> Marines, in seizing the eastern bridge crossings over the Euphrates River. That morning the battalion occupied an assault position 15 kilometers south of the city. In the assault position, companies refueled and conducted pre-combat checks. At 2200Z, the order was issued to attack and reinforce 2/8 South of the Euphrates and clear west, in zone, in order to prevent enemy interference with friendly forces on Highway 7.

At first light, 25 March, key staff moved up Highway 7 and made liaison with the staff of 2/8. They were also able to conduct a leaders reconnaissance of the battlespace. By 12002, the companies began to occupy positions astride Highway 7 oriented north and west. As 3rd battalion occupied its positions, the area was teeming with civilians. Within the crowd were numerous Army deserters from the Iraqi 11th Infantry Division and elements of the Ba'ath Party Militia and Saddam Fedayeen Militia. Incoming fires were originating from the west and from the north, across the river; however, there was also enemy fire from adjacent unit sectors, complicating immediate response with direct fire and making the employment of fire support severely challenging. Hostile forces, carrying small arms, were frequently observed moving to the west and north. Each company engaged enemy forces with direct fire while multiple counter-battery radar artillery missions were fired to neutralize enemy mortars. After establishing a linear defense extending from the riverbank to Route 8, patrols and scout sniper teams were dispatched to develop the rapidly changing situation. A rainstorm limited visibility. There was no direct contact with the enemy during the night, only sporadic mortar Over the next few days, 3rd Battalion extended its fire. perimeter, searching buildings and homes to identify and neutralize threats in the area.

## 29 March-2 April: Relief in Place (RIP) 15th MEU in Nasiriyah

On 29 March, 15<sup>th</sup> MEU(SOC) arrived in Nasiriyah to begin clearing a new sector of the city and to prepare for a relief in place of RCT-2 forces. RCT-2 and the Battalion Battle Staffs conducted liaison with the 15<sup>th</sup> MEU BLT S-3 and MEU Commander. The BLT was briefed on current situation, areas of interest, enemy activity, battle space, and current operations.

During the evening of 01 April, Special Forces conducted a raid on a hospital rumored to house EPWs, specifically Private First Class (PFC) Jessica Lynch, a member of the US Army's 507<sup>th</sup> Maintenance convoy ambushed on 23 March. The mission was successful, as the Special Forces located and liberated PFC Lynch from captivity. Battery C/1/10 fired in support of the mission, destroying a suspected weapons cache in a residence as a diversion for the Special Forces to secure the hospital. This mission would be the last mission fired by 1/10 in the Battle for Nasiriyah.

LAR was ordered to occupy blocking positions vicinity of Highway 1 and Highway 17, east of Ad Diwaniyah along the main supply routes. Between 1 and 3 April, the main focus of engineer effort became the survivability of the Battalion and the Regimental areas. Over 30 CAAT vehicle positions were dug for 2/8 and 3/2. A route into the 2/8 ALOC was improved to enhance MTVR trafficability. The Regimental Main and TAC CPs and CSSB-22's CSSOC, were surrounded with protective berms. During this period, the engineers were tasked to bury destroyed vehicles from 507<sup>th</sup> Maintenance Battalion, 2/8 and A Co, 2d CEB. The Engineer Company also maintained its blocking position south of the city limits of An Nasiryah.

## 3 - 6 April: Securing Ad Diwaniyah, An Numiniyah, and Hantush

From 3-11 April, RCT-2 conducted a series of movements designed to prevent enemy forces from counterattacking south and disrupting coalition force operations in sector. RCT-2 moved south along Route 7 to Route 1 then turned north and headed to Ad Diwaniyah to establish a defense IOT prevent southern movement of the Iraqi 10<sup>th</sup> Armored Brigade. Total distance traveled was approximately 220km.

On the morning of 4 April, RCT-2(-) left Ad Diwaniyah and headed to Al Arish in order to provide security for an expeditionary airfield that had been established along Route 1.

Additionally, 1st Battalion still had the mission of blocking Iragi movement south along Route 1. On the 6<sup>th</sup> of April, the expeditionary airfield displaced and 1st battalion conducted a repositioning of forces to better block major LOC's. That evening RCT-2(-) was instructed to conduct movement south in the vicinity of Qulat Sikkar, a distance of 175 km. Taking Route.1 south to the Route 1 and Route 17 interchange and then proceeding east along Route 17, RCT-2(-) arrived at the designated grid. At which time instructions were received to proceed an additional 25 km west and link-up with the remainder RCT-2 at Oulat Sikkar airfield. Link-up was completed and an operation order was issued directing movement to the vicinity of Al Amarah the following morning to prevent movement of Iraqi 10<sup>th</sup> Armored Division forces south and west of the Tigris River (vicinity Al Arish).

On the morning of 5 April, 3rd Battalion displaced to the Western side of the Route 7 and Route 17 intersection and established battle positions approximately 10km to the east of Ad Diwaniyah oriented West. At approximately 2200Z, 3<sup>rd</sup> Battalion received another order to displace the following day to An Numaniyah and secure the airfield. While enroute to An Numaniyah, 3<sup>rd</sup> Battalion received a change to the order. The new mission was to conduct a relief in place with 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, 23<sup>rd</sup> Marines in the city of An Numaniyah.

On 8 April, 1st Battalion initiated an 80km movement east along Route 17 and then North. That evening the battalion received instructions to retrace its route back to Qulat Sikkar on the following morning. This action was executed on the morning of 9 April. 1st Battalion arrived at Qulat Sikkar airfield and remained at that location until 11 April conducting maintenance on vehicles and equipment.

## 7 - 11 April: Southern Iraq to Al Amarah.

On the morning of 7 April, at 0345Z, RCT-2(-) moved southeast approximately 120 kilometers to Qalat Sikar Airfield. 8 April, TFT ordered to transition into camouflage uniforms, from MOPP suits, for the first time since leaving Camp Shoup on 20 March. At 0330Z, RCT-2(-) crossed the line of departure into the attack once again. The destination was Al Amarah, the method was a movement to contact to locate, close with, and destroy the 10<sup>th</sup> Armored Division.

The attack consisted of Charlie Company, 2d LAR; 1st Battalion, 2d Marines; units from 2d Battalion, 2d Marines and 1st Battalion, 10th Marines. Encountering only light resistance, RCT-2(-) occupied firing positions at 0900Z only 10 kilometers from the Tigres River. Moving closer to Al Amarah, RCT-2(-) established firing positions two kilometers from the Tigrus (only 51 miles from the Iranian border) and prepared for combat. Several hours later, RCT-2(-) was informed that the 10<sup>th</sup> Armored Division had capitulated and not to expect any fire missions.

Consequently, at 1030Z on 9 April, 1/10 and CEB returned to Qalat Sikkar Airfield to conduct maintenance and prepare for follow-on missions. It was here that members of RCT-2(-) gathered around short wave radios to hear the BBC announce the fall of Baghdad. The following day, the remainder of RCT-2 arrived at the airfield and was able to refit and repair equipment for the first time since departing Kuwait.

## 11 April-7 May: Stability Operations An Nasiriyah to Al Kut.

On 11 April, RCT-2 departed Qalat Sikkar airfield headed for Al Kut west along Route 17 to the Route 7 and Route 17 interchange and then proceeded north along Route 7 to a turnoff labeled Route River near Al Haay. As units passed through Al Haay, the local populous lined the streets and cheered as the RCT passed. This is significant because it was the first large scale welcome the RCT experienced. After moving through Al Haay, RCT-2 continued towards Al Kut. 1/2 established a position in an abandoned Republican Guard (RG) base on the south side of the Tigris River and conducted maintenance.

From 12 through 15 April, 1/2 remained at the RG Base. On the 14<sup>th</sup> instructions were received from TFT for 1/2 to cross the Tigris River and conduct security operations in a designated sector north of the Tigris and west of Al Kut. Permission was not granted to proceed directly through Al Kut due to an agreement made between TFT and the leadership of Al Kut preventing the passage of Armored vehicles through that city. As a result 1/2 had to execute a 75 km movement that involved proceeding west to an alternate crossing site and then, after crossing the Tigris, heading east towards Al Kut. 1/2 arrived at an abandoned Iragi communications facility on the morning of the 16<sup>th</sup> and remained in that location until 24 April. Between 16 and 24 April, 1/2 and 3/2 were tasked OPCON to TFT forward CP controlling the cities of Al Kut and An Numaniyah.

On 19 April, RCT-2 was notified that it would be relieving elements of the 15 MEU and 24<sup>th</sup> MEU in security operations between An Nasiriyah and Qalat Sikkur and the Dhi Qar Province. The follow on mission was to conduct Civil-Military Affairs and begin the transitional phase from war to peace and reconstructive operations. To facilitate this mission 1/2 was given the area between Qalat Sikkar and the Saddam Bridge north of An Nasiriyah, 1/10 controlled the area south of An Nasiriyah (as a provisional rifle battalion), 2/25 maintained control of the city of An Nasiriyah and was OPCON to RCT-2, A Company, 2nd Recon controlled the western bridge crossing and C Company, 2nd LAR with A Company, 2nd CEB were used as strengthening forces.

During the period 24 April through 6 May, RCT-2 was completing the multi-unit relief-in-place and conducting security operations with Phase IV forces. During this period, typical missions included: security patrols on roads and in villages, distribution of foods and medicines, identification of weapons caches and unexploded ordinance sites, establishment of elected town councils, training of local security forces, securing key facilities, and assisting in the re-establishment of local utilities (sewage, water treatment, electric).

For the Phase IV relief in place, L/3/23 was designated to assume 3/2's mission in An Numaniyah. To facilitate this turnover, the battalion conducted extensive briefs for 3/2 battalion staff and the Lima Company Commander. These briefs included vehicular tours of the city, introduction to prominent local citizens, aerial over flights of the surrounding battle space, and combined patrolling operations. 3/2 completed the handover on 8 May and executed orders to retrograde to Kuwait on 9 May. At the time of the turnover, not a single Marine or vehicle convoy had been engaged by enemy personnel in or around the vicinity of An Numaniyah while under the control of 3/23.

While conducting these missions 1/2(Rein) was instructed to prepare for retrograde to Kuwait. On 2 May, A Co 8<sup>th</sup> Tanks departed for Jalibah Airfield to turn in ammunition and prepare for movement via Heavy Equipment Transport (HET). Between 2 and 4 May, HETs from an Army National Guard Unit transported all Armored and Mechanized assets of 1/2 to Kuwaiti Naval Base. Beginning 6 May, RCT-2 conducted a relief in place with Second Battalion, 25<sup>th</sup> Marines in vicinity of An Nasariyah. On 7 May, 1/2 held a memorial ceremony to honor its fallen in the vicinity of the northern bridge spanning the Sadaam Canal. 1/2 was flown the following day to Camp Shoup in USMC KC-130 aircraft. 3/2 executed the retrograde order on 9 May. The one-day trip involved one vehicle accident that involved a ground MEDIVAC to Al Kut airfield and one stop at Jalibah Airfield for re-fueling. The vehicle had only minor damage, was towed to Camp Shoup and subsequently driven to Kuwati Naval Base for back-load. On the 10<sup>th</sup>, the entire unit reorganized, accounted for RBE items, and mobile loaded vehicles for the trip to Kuwaiti Naval Base and subsequently onto the USS Kearsarge and USS Baatan.

On 21 April, 1/10's TAC CP and battery advance parties departed to locate a position south of An Nasiriyah, a move over 100 kilometers. Signaling the coming of Phase IV, the advance elements of the battalion located a position within the headquarters of the 11<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division from which the battalion would conduct "Stabilization Operations."

1/10's main body fell in on the battalion advance parties south of An Nasiriyah on 23 April. After a day of repose, the battalion began executing Phase IV tasks and missions. As the month of April came to a close, the battalion said farewell to its three fallen officers. On the morning of 28 April, the battalion held a memorial service for 1stLt (posthumously) Fred E. Pokorney, Jr. The service was held near the northern bridge, crossing the Saddam Canal. 1stLt Pokorney died seizing this bridge. On the morning of 30 April, a memorial service was held for Chief Warrant Officer 2 Andrew T. Arnold and Chief Warrant Officer 2 Robert W. Channel Jr., the two Marines who died in the RPG training accident.

After a Relief in Place near Al Kut, C Company, 2d LAR joined the Regimental Reserve outside of An Numaniyah. С Company rearmed and refitted in vicinity of Logistics Support Area (LSA) Chesty. Charlie secured a large ammunition supply point three kilometers west of LSA Chesty. The company ran mounted patrols and secured the site for 2/6 as they relieved LAR. C Company then road marched back to An Nasiriyah. At An Nasiriyah, the company worked closely with Civil Affairs. Two banks were secured and convoy security was provided in the transfer of two billion dinar. At the ALOC, C Company conducted mounted and dismounted patrols where more ammunition caches were uncovered. After coordination with Navy EOD, these weapons were destroyed.

From 20 March 2003 through 20 May 2003, RCT-2 moved over 900 miles and destroyed the enemy in a number of pitched battles on its way to Tigris River and beyond. RCT-2's losses included 22 killed in action. The Marines of RCT-2 spent 18 days in MOPP 1 or 2. Throughout, extended lines of communication, bad weather, and limited resources challenged RCT-2. Once the RCT-2 attacked across the Iraqi border, it continued to press the enemy and keep him off balance. In the end, the pressure exerted by RCT-2 on the enemy robbed him of the initiative and shattered his will to fight in zone. RCT-2's accomplishments during Operation IRAQI FREEDOM are a testimony to the mettle and competence of the Marines and Sailors of the RCT-2. Their indomitable will, innovativeness, flexibility, aggressiveness, and initiative allowed RCT-2 to attack along unexpected avenues of approach and rapidly cover great distances while consistently integrating combined arms and maneuver at the decisive time and place.
