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Advanced Flag and Executive Training Course (AFLEX)

The Advanced Flag and Senior Executive Training Symposium (AFLEX) is a 5-day intensive residential learning experience that is designed to ensure the successful transformation of Flag Officers and Senior Executive Service members (SES) into new roles as members of the Navy's most senior leadership team. The course is designed to provide you the opportunity to further explore and refine your professional identities as full partners in the Navy profession, strengthen your ability to assess risk to self, mission, and the Navy in making ethical decisions, deepen your cognitive capacity, and leverage higher-order thinking. Advanced learning methods suited for executive-level leader development will be used. As participants, you can expect disruptive engagement, peer interaction, facilitated discourse, and directed reflection. Flag/General Officer and SES equivalent attendance at AFLEX is by invitation.

The Department of Defense (DoD) Advanced Professional Executive (APEX) Senior Executive Service (SES) Orientation Program provides a high-quality, joint orientation for new SES members. APEX helps new leaders gain an enterprise-wide perspective that encompasses expectations, opportunities, and challenges currently facing DoD leadership.

The two-week executive development program is offered twice a year for newly appointed DoD SES and Senior Professionals. It is designed to provide program participants with a practical and theoretical understanding of the structure and processes of the Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD), the Combatant Commands (COCOMs), the Joint Staff (JS), and the Military Departments. Week One of the program is conducted in the Washington, DC area; during Week Two, participants travel to CoCOMs and select military installations across the United States.

Course Objectives:

- The structure and processes of the OSD, the CoCOMs, JS, and the Military Departments as they contribute to the DoD mission.
- The priorities and challenges of other Federal agencies and the Defense industry as they contribute to National Security in partnership with DoD.
- The contributions and challenges of the Soldiers, Marines, Sailors, Airmen and Coast Guardsmen within the context of the overarching Defense mission.
- The importance of information sharing and relationship building across the total force through networking opportunities with military and civilian colleagues.
- An enterprise-wide perspective that encompasses leadership expectations and challenges currently facing DoD leaders.
- The changing role of the SES corps within DoD.

• Career SES members should attend APEX within three years of their appointment. A minimum of a Secret clearance is required for program participation.

Artificial Intelligence for National Security Leaders

Artificial Intelligence (AI) technologies promise to be the most powerful tools in generations for expanding knowledge, increasing prosperity, and enriching the human experience. Al will fuel competition between governments and companies racing to field it, and it will be employed by nation-states to pursue their strategic ambitions. The 2.5-day Artificial Intelligence for National Security Leaders course in Cambridge, MA provides Department of Defense (DOD) senior leaders with a foundational understanding of AI, what AI means for national security, and how to take advantage of AI. With a focus on the organizational and managerial implications of these technologies, grounded in the technical aspects, participants leave this program armed with the knowledge they need to lead the successful integration of AI into national security. Informed senior leaders will lead the change necessary to help manifest the promise of AI for the DOD and transform how the nation and its strategic goals are defended.

Art of War

The Art of War Program (AoW) is an academically rigorous graduate-level executive education program in preparation for leadership roles demanding long-range strategic and critical thinking skills held at The Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies, Johns Hopkins University, Washington D.C. The AoW supports the National Defense Strategy (NDS) by forming a group of General Officers (GOs) who will be educated to think critically in the design and conduct of war, strategy, and operations in the broader context of national policy objectives to assist civilian leaders in understanding the art of war. This executive education program is unique in its intense focus on the development of joint, cross-service senior officers who can operate in unknown environments, deal with unanticipated challenges, and seek innovative approaches to why, how, when, and where we fight.

Course Objectives:

- Investigate, analyze, and critique complex scholarly works and, where applicable, policy documents relevant to war, strategy, and command and leadership.
- Justify and interpret theoretical propositions, methodologies, and conclusions in strategy, military operations, and command and leadership.
- Synthesize complex theories relating to the conduct of war and strategy.
- Design, evaluate, and analyze developments in war, strategy and learning and adaptation.

Supporting Information:

 The course is taught by a case study method. There are no lectures; the core of the program is classroom discussion and debate, known as the Socratic Method.

Capstone

Capstone is a mandatory (required by law, title 10, U.S. Code, Section 663) for all active-duty Brigadier Generals, to include selectees (who must attend within two years after promotion) and one selected reserve Brigadier General per year. This course is held four times per year at the National Defense University (NDU), Ft McNair, Washington, DC. CAPSTONE consists of seminars, case studies, informal discussions, visits to key US military commands within the continental United States, and overseas trips to Europe, the Pacific, and the Western Hemisphere. CAPSTONE focuses on the employment of U.S. forces in joint and combined operations to support national policy objectives. It provides personal interaction with Combatant Commanders, other senior U.S. commanders and retired four-star general and flag officers to provide advice and guidance. Additionally, NDU offers a unique, optional program for spouses of CAPSTONE attendees. This program is offered in conjunction with the final (sixth) week of the CAPSTONE Course.

CAPSTONE consists of seminars, case studies, informal discussions, visits to key US military commands within the continental United States, and overseas trips to Europe, the Pacific, and the Western Hemisphere. CAPSTONE focuses on the employment of U.S. forces in joint and combined operations to support national policy objectives. It provides personal interaction with Combatant Commanders, other senior U.S. commanders and retired four-star general and flag officers to provide advice and guidance. The Combined/Joint Force Air Component Commander Course (C/JFACC) is held at Maxwell AFB, Alabama and focuses on understanding combined doctrine and air and space power employment in theater-level operations. All military services send one- and two-stars (or selects) to this course. The focus is on warfighting, military doctrine, and the application of unified, combined combat forces with particular emphasis on air power employment in theater-level operations.

The Combined/Joint Land Component Commander Course (C/JFLCC) is a senior-officer level professional education course conducted at the US Army War College, Carlisle, Pennsylvania, under the direction of Training and Doctrine Command (TRADOC). The course prepares senior officers to function effectively as Land Component Commanders for theater-level operations conducted in a multinational and interagency environment. Commanders will prepare themselves to formulate and execute complex land operations that provide Combatant Commanders with a full spectrum of rapid, decisive, and sustained land dominance capabilities that are critical to effective national policy accomplishment.

The course is conducted at Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania and is limited to 14 General Officers from all services. Attendees arrive at Carlisle on the Saturday prior to the course and depart after completion of the course on the following Friday.

Combined Force Maritime Component Commander Course (CFMCC)

The purpose of the one-week Combined/Joint Maritime Component Commander Course (CFMCC) is to develop a network of leaders, focused on the operational level, in support of cooperation in the theater, and oriented toward maritime security is held at one of the four regional sites (see supporting information for locations). It serves as a forum to develop and deepen relationships based upon trust and confidence among stakeholders/nations in the framework of regional challenges. The CFMCC course addresses the practical challenges confronting the maritime operational commander. Actual regional concerns, and the CFMCC capabilities to address those concerns, are the basis for course discussions and study.

Joint Force Maritime Component Commander Course (JFMCC)

The one-week Joint Force Maritime Component Commanders Course (JFMCC) is designed for Major Generals, is held at the U.S. Naval War College, Newport, Rhode Island. The purpose of the JFMCC course is to prepare future Maritime Component Commanders to plan and execute complex maritime operations. The JFMCC course addresses the practical challenges confronting the maritime operational commander, actual regional concerns, and the JFMCC capabilities to address those concerns, are the basis for course discussions and study. Further, the course considers existing JFMCC concepts and doctrine, operational-level capabilities, command and control processes and applications, and the considerations and expectations of joint force commanders as well as supporting functional component commanders. Sessions will be held up to the TS SCI classification level for the joint course.

Combined/Joint Force Special Operations Component Commander Course

Priority: Special Operations Component billets, Ground Combat Element and Ground related billets

The five-day Combined/Joint Force Special Operations Component Commander Course (C/JFSOCC) is held at the Davis Conference Center, MacDill Air Force Base, Florida and is designed to prepare C/JFSOCCs and other senior leaders for theater-level leadership at the operational level. This course is sponsored and controlled by USSOCOM, with course development and execution delegated to the President, Joint Special Operations University. Instruction for the course comes from senior national-level civilians and military representatives; flag officers serving as combatant commanders; and retired, battle-tested officers. Attendees study warfighting, military doctrine, and application of unified, joint, combined combat forces and interagency synchronization so they will be better prepared to face future crises as a functional component commander. To facilitate a seminar learning experience, each class will not exceed 18 attendees, comprised of flag officers representing all Military Services and senior interagency representatives.

Cybersecurity: The Intersection of Policy and Technology

MCTFS Code: 22Z

Course Type: Cyber / Information Technology

Grades Supported: CSEL, BGen (Select) - LtGen, SES equivalents
Priority: Cyber and Information Operations related billets

The Cyber Security: The Intersection of Policy and Technology course is offered at Harvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts. In a world with almost limitless data collection capability, where cyber-attacks can propagate instantaneously and where the identity or location of an adversary may not be known, individuals and institutions are increasingly vulnerable to network-based intrusions that disrupt productivity, jeopardize privacy, and threaten national security. The security and resilience of critical infrastructure and technology in the U.S. and around the world requires constant vigilance against cyber threats. Despite the magnitude of the problem, the field of cyber security strategy, policy, and management is nascent.

The curriculum will focus on the technical and policy aspects of security, surveillance, and conflict; however, participants will come away with skills applicable to other situations in which policy and technology interact. Based on case studies drawn from recent events, participants will develop techniques of risk analysis and threat-modeling applicable to a broad set of problems.

The intensive curriculum is led by a team of Harvard faculty members, policy makers, and leading practitioners in the field of cyber security, many of whom advise governments, agencies, and industry around the world on security and technology. Lectures and case studies will bring focus to issues at the intersection of cyber policy and technology, while collaborative group sessions will enable participants to engage directly with the issues, solve problems, and discuss how insights and cyber security measures can be applied in their own countries and organizations.

Cyberspace Operations Executive Course (COEC)

The focus of COEC is primarily centered on the strategic decision-making aspects of cyber policy. Instruction for the course comes from national-level civilians, industry and academic experts and leaders who offer senior perspectives on defining the cyberspace problem set; executive/legislative perspectives; information assurance; legal implications; academic perspectives; cyberspace integration; foreign policy; and national options. The attendee level rotates every 6 months from the Senior COEC (3- and 4-star level) to the COEC (1- and 2-star level). 2-day course offered twice annually with 12 to 18 attendees per course. The course is held at Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama.

The Impact Immersive Experience/Impact Human Performance course (IIE/IHP) is a 2.5-day course that provides participants with an understanding and experience of the Human Energy System to achieve sustained high performance. The interconnected system that consists of our Mind (storytelling), Body (physiology), Spirit (purpose), and Heart (emotional regulation) drives both performance and resilience. Participants gain greater awareness of how to optimize energy, recover more effectively from stress and anxiety, while increasing the frequency of moments where they are being at their best. Individuals and/or teams work side-by-side with highly skilled experts in performance psychology, nutrition, and exercise physiology. This multi-disciplinary approach helps practitioners to become physically energized, emotionally, and mentally resilient, and completely aligned with whatever objective is most important.

This five-day course provides intensive and interactive executive education in which fellows and faculty work together to identify and evaluate opportunities for international cooperation. Fellows will critically assess the complex and dynamic security environment in the Indo-Pacific region, its security architecture, and emerging trends. They will build upon their senior leadership skills to advance effective security sector governance in the Indo-Pacific region. The Senior Executive Seminar will be embedded within the IPOC course, with several hours of daily seminar discussions complemented by the full range of plenary and elective lectures in the regular IPOC.

This five-day, in-residence course is held at Maxwell AFB, Alabama, and the chiefs of staff of all four branches of the US armed forces own and control the course. The course prepares two-star officers of all four services for the responsibilities of theater-level combat leadership. It is tailored to provide our future theater commanders in chief (CINC), service component, and joint task force (JTF) commanders with a broad perspective of the strategic and operational levels of war. Instruction comes from senior national civilian and military representatives, flag officers serving as CINCs, and retired, battle-tested officers. Attendees study warfighting, synchronization of interagency operations, military doctrine, and the application of unified, joint, and combined combat forces so they will be better prepared to face future crises. Each class is limited to 18 flag officers representing all Military Services.

This course examines the roles of military officers; senior civilians; political appointees; Congress; the media; leaders of industry; and international organizations within the upper echelons of the national and international security community.

The Senior Executives in National and International Security (NIS) program provides a forum for senior executives to deepen their understanding of current security issues and exercise their evaluation and decision-making skills in a group of their peers, all while contributing their own ideas and perspectives. The program is a rigorous two-week session consisting of formal classes, discussion groups, interactive seminars, exercises, guest speakers, and informal conversations with faculty, colleagues, students, and staff.

Attendees explore the major pillars of IO, military doctrine, and application of IO resources so they will be better prepared to as future senior leaders. To facilitate a seminar learning experience, each class is limited to about 18 G/FOs or civilian equivalents, representing all Military Services and the United States Coast Guard.

SEC is a two-day familiarization course providing an executive space overview for senior members of the Department of Defense (DoD), other US government agencies, and allied nations. The course focuses on the following areas: A brief coverage of space fundamentals (including space environment and orbital mechanics), an overview of space law/policy/doctrine, capabilities/limitations/vulnerabilities of DoD, National, civil, and commercial space systems, and space integration into multi-domain terrestrial operations. This course provides senior personnel with an awareness of unique space capabilities providing combat effects for warfighters. The course is designed for senior members of the DoD, other US government agencies, and allied nations.

The SEC is held at the National Security Space Institute (NSSI), Peterson AFB in Colorado Springs, CO. The NSSI is the US Space Force's focal point for space continuing education, complementing existing space education programs at <u>Air University</u>, the <u>Naval Postgraduate School</u> and the <u>Air Force Institute of Technology</u>. Their mission is to provide the responsive and relevant professional continuing education component of DoD space professional development.

Strategic Thinking is a five-day course that is conducted at the University of Virginia, Darden School of Business, Charlottesville, VA. This intensive program is designed to provide senior executives (uniformed and civilian) with the skills needed to successfully navigate the complex policy, strategy, and execution issues confronting them at both the command and Enterprise levels. ST provides a collaborative environment for participants to examine a wide range of issues and learn new skills in topics ranging from innovation, business transformation and financial management to diversity, information technology and strategic planning. Academic experts are joined by senior executives from both the Navy and the private sector to provide participants with a range of perspectives through which course objectives are addressed.

ST brings participants together with the Navy's most senior leaders for opportunities to discuss policy and strategy issues that impact their commands. Private sector executives and prominent thought leaders share their insights on established and emerging business trends and best practices that may have application in participants' organizations.

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Transnational Security Cooperation Senior Executive Course

MCTFS Code: KEJ

Course Type: Regional: Asia Grades Supported: MajGen - LtGen

Priority: MARFORPAC and Asia-Pacific related billets

This is an intensive, one-week program for current security sector leaders – both civilian and military — on the upward track for positions of significant national and international responsibility. The course will look at a comprehensive array of emergent and over-the-horizon issues such as: terrorism, environmental degradation, natural disasters, geopolitical competition, maritime disputes, cyber threats, civil-military dynamics, and regional governance. The course will also consider "harder" geo-strategic issues such as power shifts among nations as part of the context in which broader security concerns play out. Senior Fellows will interactively exercise strategic thinking and cooperative responses to real-world transnational security scenarios (e.g., the evolving security dynamics on the Korean Peninsula). The program is based on the broad notion that regional security is significantly enhanced by collaborative efforts at monitoring, preventing, preparing for or responding to any transitional security threat. The EEP nominates potential participants to the Asia Pacific Center for Security Studies and final participant selections are made by the Asia Pacific Center for Security Studies and PACOM leadership. The TSCSEC is held at the Asia Pacific Center for Security Studies, Honolulu, Hawaii and is patterned after the George C. Marshall Center for Security Studies.
