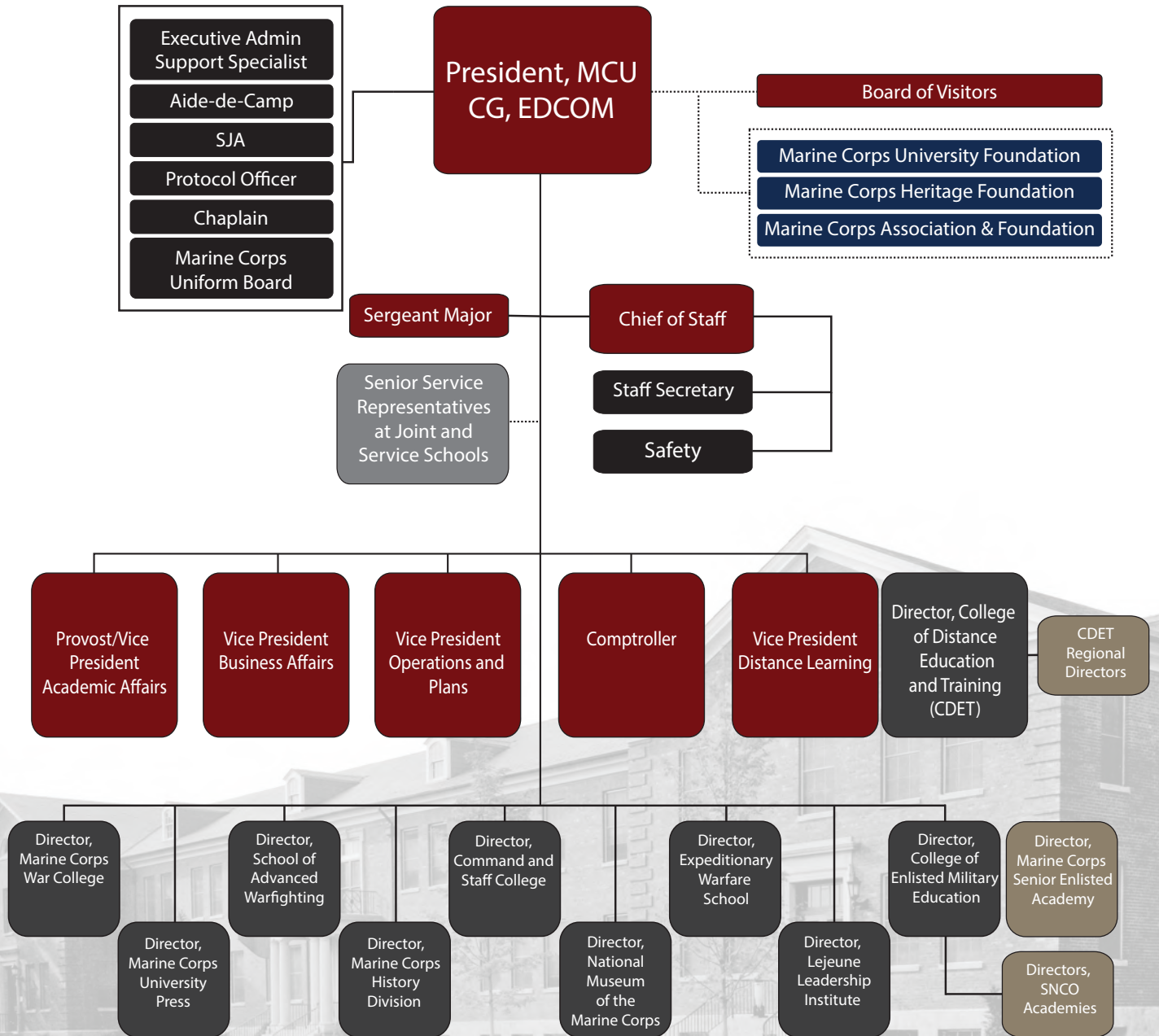

COLLEGE OF DISTANCE EDUCATION AND TRAINING

Mission Statement

Design, develop, deliver, evaluate, manage, and resource distance learning programs and products across the Marine Corps Training and Education Continuum in order to increase operational readiness.

Programs

All CDET PME programs have the same mission and learning outcomes as their resident counterpart program, with minor exceptions based on delivering learning via distributed means.

The Enlisted College Distance Education Program (ECDEP) provides a continuum of education to improve leadership, sharpen critical and creative thinking skills, and deepen Marines' understanding of warfighting concepts in distributed/Joint environments to foster ethical, professional leaders who make sound decisions in complex operational situations. The following five interactive multimedia distance education programs (DEP) are available on MarineNet and are prerequisites for the associated command-sponsored or resident courses: Leading Marines DEP, Corporals Course DEP, Sergeants School DEP, Career School DEP, and Advanced School DEP. Further, the Sergeants School Seminar Program (SSSP), Career School Seminar Program (CSSP), and the Advanced School Seminar Program (ASSP) provide additional opportunities for sergeants through gunnery sergeants, total force, to complete PME for grade when unable to attend the resident Staff NCO Academy. Finally, a Senior Enlisted Blended Seminar Program, a 12-week blended program to replace the current First Sergeant and Master Sergeant Seminar, will soon be available at MCB Quantico; Camp Pendleton, CA; Camp Lejeune, NC; and Camp Butler, Okinawa.

The Expeditionary Warfare School Distance Education Program (EWSDEP) educates and trains company grade officers and chief warrant officer 3s (CWO3) to prepare them mentally and morally for billets of increased responsibility across the Fleet Marine Force and the Joint force, with emphasis on the warfighting capabilities of a Marine Air-Ground Task Force operating within a complex and distributed naval expeditionary environment. It provides an online prerequisite self-study module followed by four major courses taken by onsite seminar. Online seminars are only offered on a case-by-case basis. The program is designed to be completed in two years, while the blended seminar program can be completed in one year at Quantico, VA; Camp Pendleton, CA; Camp Lejeune, NC; Camp Butler, Okinawa; and MCB Hawaii. Civilian university partners also offer master's degree credits in certain disciplines.

The Command and Staff College Distance Education Program (CSCDEP) is an intermediate-level, JPME Phase I accredited program primarily designed for majors and CWO4s. It provides onsite, weekend, online, and blended seminars to those officers who cannot attend resident CSC. The eight-course program is designed to be completed in two years although the blended seminar program can be completed in one year at Quantico, VA; Camp Pendleton, CA; and Camp Lejeune, NC. Civilian university partners also offer master's degree credits in certain disciplines.

CDET's Continuing Education Program (CEP) stands as an innovative model for distance education in the Marine Corps. Its goal is to share Marine Corps University's expertise through online elective courses, videos, and staff rides, complementing formal PME. CEP's impact is highlighted by 11 enhanced elective courses endorsed by the American Council on Education (ACE) for undergraduate credit transfer, underscoring the courses' quality and instruction. The CEP also supports the Junior Enlisted Performance Evaluation System (JEPES) initiative by providing high-quality educational content for junior Marines. These Marines can simultaneously enhance their foundational knowledge and future promotion opportunities by earning continuing education units (CEUs) from each CEP course. While any Marine can enroll in any CEP elective, the Marine Corps Virtual Classroom (MCVC) courses are specifically tailored to the needs of the junior Marines by providing enhanced flexibility and instructors who are active duty staff noncommissioned officers (SNCOs).

CDET also has a significant training mission designing, developing, delivering, and overseeing a range of educational resources such as courseware, job aids, mobile content, and other digital materials to support Training and Education Command's distance learning training needs. CDET employs its E-learning ecosystem to facilitate Marine Corps distance learning, integrating both asynchronous and synchronous educational technologies. This ecosystem encompasses conferencing, collaborative communities, and standalone video services, fostering innovative teaching and learning methods suited for the modern era.

MARINE CORPS DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY PROGRAM

Purpose

The Marine Corps Doctor of Philosophy Program's (PhDP) purpose is to develop a cohort of strategic and technical thinkers and leaders capable of applying substantive knowledge, directing original research, and leveraging relationships with industry and elements of national security. Uniformed officers with doctorate level education provide deployable highly skilled manpower support to senior leaders, as well as help generate national, defense, and service strategies in an increasingly complex world. Senior leadership recognizes the need to develop resident talent within the Corps and manage and retain our highly educated officers.

Program Tracks

There are two unique PhD Program tracks. The Strategic PhD Track candidates are selected to attend resident civilian PhD education programs. Schools and disciplines include programs related to the study of strategy, national security, military history, public policy, political science, and government. The Technical PhD Track candidates are selected to attend the Naval Postgraduate School and enroll in a PhD program in the fields of operations research, modeling virtual environments, information sciences, and computer science.

LEJEUNE LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE

Mission Statement

The Lejeune Leadership Institute (LLI) develops leadership training, education, and policies in order to facilitate the development of ethical leaders firmly rooted in Marine Corps heritage of selfless service, core values, and warfighting excellence. To achieve this, LLI proposes new ideas and provides training and education in the areas of leadership and ethics within Marine Corps University and throughout the total force. LLI also facilitates leadership training and education for both uniformed and civilian leaders.

LLI's vision is to be the Marine Corps' premier institute in leadership and ethics so that its leaders are prepared to thrive in an evolving and complex world.

Cornerstone Program

The Commandant of the Marine Corps established the Commanders Program in 1993 to better prepare colonel- and lieutenant colonel-level commanders and their spouses for the unique challenges of command. The program evolved over time into Cornerstone: The Commandant's Combined Commandership Course, and now includes both command senior enlisted leaders (CSEL) and their spouses. Taking place two to three times per year, attendance in the course is mandatory for commanders and CSELS but is optional for spouses. The commander and CSEL course is conducted during a two-week period, while the Cornerstone Spouses Workshop is five days long and runs concurrently with the second week of the commander/CSEL course. Cornerstone overviews the current state of Marine Corps, presenting best practices and policies pertinent to commanders, CSELS, and their spouses.

Brigadier General Select Orientation Course

LLI administers the first week of the two-week Brigadier General Select Orientation Course (BGSOC), in coordination with TECOM, the overall program manager. BGSOC is attended by newly selected brigadier generals and their Senior Executive Service (SES), civilian equivalents. LLI's portion of the course examines the current state of Marine Corps and introduces best practices and policies relevant to general officers, SESs, and their spouses. BGSOC's second week is administered by the MAGTF Staff Training Program and focuses primarily on classified wargaming and threat briefs.

Slated Enlisted Leader Orientation Course

LLI supports the Marine Corps Senior Enlisted Academy (MCSEA) in administering the Slated Enlisted Leader Ori-

tation Course (SELOC). SELOC is a two-week program attended by newly selected master gunnery sergeants (E9s) slated to serve on command teams at the general officer level. SELOC's first week consists primarily of classified wargames and threat briefs that highlight how general officers think strategically, plan operationally, and act tactically in a contested environment. Its second week examines the advisory role of slated enlisted leaders and provides the preparation required to serve effectively on command teams at the brigadier general (O7) level.

Executive Education Program

The Commandant of the Marine Corps established the Executive Education Program (EEP) in 2005 in order to provide structure to the professional growth and assignment strategy for general officers (GO), SES, and O7-level Command Slated Enlisted Leaders (CSEL-SgtMaj and MGySgt) members.

LLI is tasked with managing the program for the president, MCU. LLI, in concert with M&RA (MMSL & MPC) and Marine Corps Senior Enlisted Academy (MCSEA), reviews and recommends changes to approximately 32+ EEP courses, solicits participation, builds a slate for the president's, MCU, approval, and manages all administrative matters for GO, SES, and CSEL participation through completion of courses to include all funding. Analysis of GO, SES, and CSEL participation feedback is used to ensure courses remain relevant and effective.

Ethics and Ethical Decision-Making

Since 2010, the LLI Ethics Branch (EB) has provided ethics and ethical decision-making training throughout all programs associated with Marine Corps University. The EB uses various teaching methods from lecture to case study and focuses content at the appropriate level, including both resident and nonresident programs.

The EB continues to send mobilization training teams (MTT) to requesting commands across the Corps in order to provide leadership, ethics, and moral decision instruction. These MTTs are specifically used for "train the trainer" sessions that enable command leadership the capability to deliver ethics instruction in their commands.

The EB regularly publishes articles and books through the Marine Corps University Press and the U.S. Naval Institute highlighting topics and themes vital to an ethical military in both peace and combat. In addition, the Ethics Branch is routinely requested to take part in conferences, seminars, and other training opportunities across the DOD and with allied nations' militaries.

Marine Leader Development (MLD)

In September 2012, the Commandant directed LLI to design a leadership development initiative for the Marine Corps to deliberately continue the growth of Marine leaders and strengthen unit cohesion.

The MCO 1500.61 Marine Leader Development (MLD) provides a broad framework for developing leaders at the unit level to strengthen unit readiness and help individual Marines achieve their full potential. MLD is completely tailorable and intended to be unit-specific, affording maximum flexibility for a commander and subordinate leaders to draw from a variety of resources that will most positively impact the development and growth of their Marines. MLD is designed to maintain a simple and overarching approach in that it replaces the cumbersome Mentoring Program, clarifies counseling intervals, and organizes "packs" of available current and future leadership resources (e.g., Marine Total Fitness). To support the MCO, LLI created and maintains a public website that provides relevant and current information on programs, policies, orders, and directives as well as numerous best practices focused on developing the whole Marine. Captured in six functional areas, the website is organized to provide individual Marines and small unit leaders a clearing house of information for enhancing personal and professional development across our Corps.

Marine Corps Civilian Leadership Development Program (MCCLDP)

The Marine Corps Civilian Leadership Development Program (MCCLDP) was established on 5 January 2010 affirming the Marine Corps' commitment to civilian leadership development. The MCCLDP is the platform for civilians to acquire leadership skills in response to federal regulations that address DOD-defined leadership competencies for federal employees. The program is for Marine Corps civilians (GS 4-15 and their equivalents).

MCCLDP is progressive leadership development through a nonsequential, four-tiered approach. This program consists of leadership modules available on MarineNet, local leadership programs funded by the LLI, leadership development seminars, and centrally managed courses that are board-selected and grade-level specific. LLI is continually working to provide valid and relevant leadership training to civilian Marines.

RESEARCH & OUTREACH

Mission Statement

Research and outreach are critical parts of the intellectual life of Marine Corps University. These activities bring new knowledge into the classroom, equip decision-makers with relevant analyses, and contribute to the reputation of the university. In addition to the dedicated capabilities described in this section, MCU's faculty, staff, and students conduct research on a broad range of topics relevant to national security affairs.

Student research papers from MCU's Command and Staff College, School of Advanced Warfighting, and War College are available through the Library of the Marine Corps' student papers site.

MCU's faculty, staff, and students conduct outreach connecting the university to national security organizations, local communities, and academic professional associations in the United States and abroad through collaborative projects, invited talks, conference participation, and professional service. Additionally, MCU has a university-level outreach program with initiatives described below.

MCU Institutional Outreach Program

The MCU Outreach Program includes various areas of outreach to include: the Academic Research Assistant, Volunteer, and Internship Program; the MCU Speakers Bureau; the MCU Outreach Consortium; and other collaborative working arrangements with outside agencies and organizations.

Speakers Bureau

MCU's Speakers Bureau helps connect MCU's experts to civic organizations, schools, businesses, and other public groups. The purpose of MCU Speakers Bureau is to allow Marine Corps University to share the expertise of its diverse faculty through community engagement by offering our faculty members the opportunity to provide their views over a broad range of informative topics during community events.

The mission of the Marine Corps University Speakers Bureau is to offer speakers who are particularly educated and knowledgeable about certain subject matter or with experiences related to MCU's mission and to educate and inform the public and sponsoring organizations about the Marine Corps, Marine Corps University, and its professional military education (PME) continuum and educational programs. Specific topics include but are not limited to PME curricula and

other military-related academic subjects (e.g., military history and leadership), issues in education, and critical thinking. MCU Outreach Consortium

In support of MCU Strategic Plan Goal 5 (Outreach, Partnership, Research, and Strategic Communication), the MCU Outreach Consortium was developed to build and strengthen outreach bridges. The Outreach Consortium membership currently consists of members representing the military Services, government agencies, and public and private institutions of higher education. The Outreach Consortium meets semiannually to discuss current and future collaborations.

MCU Academic Research Assistant, Internship, and Volunteer Program

The Academic Research Assistant, Internship, and Volunteer Program is designed to provide support to Marine Corps University faculty and staff. In general, faculty and staff, working with their educational program deans/directors, will be responsible for screening, selecting, evaluating, and coordinating all details regarding research assistants and interns. MCU research assistants (RAs) provide support on a variety of tasks and projects and are funded by the Marine Corps University Foundation (MCUF), pending available funding. Volunteers may work with faculty at the discretion of the faculty member and dean/director. Applicants must be U.S. citizens and 18 years of age on or before the first day of reporting for duty.

The Brute Krulak Center for Innovation and Future Warfare houses a number of regional and security functions, some additional information is provided below:

Center for Regional and Security Studies (CRSS)

Mission Statement

CRSS works to prepare Marines for the unknown by developing their ability to anticipate and overcome regional and security challenges associated with operating in culturally complex environments. As a subset of the Brute Krulak Center for Innovation and Future Warfare, CRSS houses critical capabilities charged with honing Marines' cognitive advantage so they can function more effectively during military operations. To accomplish this mission, CRSS manages and delivers regional, cultural, and security studies programming supporting the learning continuum of Marines' careers. Additionally, CRSS expands resources available to Marines through collaboration, outreach, and publication, and ensures access to cultural resources for the total force. CRSS's efforts are organized along three lines of operation: education, subject matter expert support, and plans and policy.

Education

CRSS supports Marines' professional development through education and training initiatives. On the education front, CRSS staff support all Marine Corps University schools, contributing to core classes, electives, panels, lectures, and subject matter expertise during schoolhouse exercises. CRSS staff offer breadth and depth on both area studies and culture general concepts and skills, providing Marines the tools to navigate the cultural complexities of contemporary operating environments, mission sets, and relationships.

CRSS also develops, executes, and manages the Regional and Culture Studies Program (RCSP). This total force initiative is the Marine Corps' voluntary distance learning program that instills, develops, and sustains foundational regional and culture capabilities in our Marines. The end state of this program is to enhance cross-cultural competence across the total force. Marines of all ranks are eligible to enroll in any of 17 separate curriculums focused on varying micro regions across the globe. As Marines advance through their careers, they reflect on and deepen their learning about regional and global considerations while honing their understanding of culture-general concepts and skills. The four-block RCSP

education continuum encompasses a foundational introduction to operational culture, its considerations in tactical scenarios, the impact of culture on military operations, and the implications of operational culture on planning. It is designed to ensure Marines are globally aware and regionally focused to effectively navigate culturally complex operating environments and relationships. The RCSP was reviewed by the American Council on Education in June 2017, and Marines who complete RCSP can receive six college credits (three semester hours in the lower-division baccalaureate/associates category in global and cultural awareness and three semester hours in the upper-division baccalaureate degree category in intercultural communication). Additionally, the RCSP provides junior enlisted Marines with an opportunity to earn more than 44 continuing education units as part of the Junior Enlisted Performance Evaluation System. Reservists who complete the RCSP can also earn as many as 20 Reserve retirement points. RCSP completion for all Marines is documented by a Master Brief Sheet Service School Code annotation.

Subject Matter Expert Support

On the training front, CRSS maintains an in-house capability, resources, and contract flexibility to provide deploying individuals and units the needed cultural information and subject matter expert support to prepare for upcoming deployments and other operational requirements. CRSS staff maintain an online repository of materials and resources available for download and can offer in-person and VTC classes and support. CRSS can also augment capabilities, if needed, to remain responsive to deploying units' needs and requirements.

Plans and Policy

CRSS works to formally incorporate language, regional expertise, and culture (LREC) capabilities and concepts into Marine Corps and Joint processes, doctrine, and policies. Work includes, but is not limited to, supporting LREC operational advisory groups, authoring and managing the execution of associated Marine Corps publications, and ensuring LREC is consistently represented in Service and Joint doctrine. Additionally, CRSS contributes to establishing and maintaining LREC training standards while advocating for LREC integration activities across the DOTMLPF combat development pillars.

Mission Statement

The General Alfred M. Gray Jr. Marine Corps Research Center (GRC) houses the Library of the Marine Corps and the GRC Conference Center. Combined, their mission is to support study, research, and instruction at all levels throughout the Marine Corps. The GRC coordinates and provides access to research resources, services, and facilities to support professional military education.

The Library of the Marine Corps (LoMC) consists of three branches: Research Branch, Virtual Branch, and Quantico Base Library. The Research and Virtual Branches directly support Marine Corps University.

The Research Branch provides access to print and electronic academic and professional research resources in support of professional military education. Its services consist of instructing and assisting patrons in selecting and using the most appropriate resources for their research needs, interlibrary loan, and copyright coordination services for students and faculty.

The Virtual Branch manages acquisition and administration of software applications, digital collections, and systems used to catalog and provide access to the LoMC's resources. It ensures effective delivery of digital information and research resources to MCU students, faculty, and staff both on and off campus.

The Quantico Base Library, supported by Marine Corps Community Services, provides educational, informational, and recreational library needs for military personnel and their family members stationed aboard MCB Quantico.

The GRC Conference Center is available for professional meetings and conferences that enhance and support MCU's mission. The GRC has eight meeting rooms that hold from 8 to 30 people. The Conference Center features a three-room modular space and a 247-seat auditorium for short conferences and meetings. The auditorium and adjacent three-room modular space are cleared for conferences to the secret level. The Conference Center is not available for private functions.

HISTORY DIVISION

Mission Statement

The mission of History Division is to preserve, present, promote, and document the history of the Marine Corps and how it relates to United States history. Archivists and historians collect documents and accounts of permanent value to the Corps' history, preserve them for future use, and distribute the history of the Corps through publications, papers, and other programs in order to preserve history, aid combat and noncombat decision-making, support PME, motivate Marines, and inform the American public.

The Histories Branch

The Histories Branch preserves and presents Marine Corps history through a variety of written products including definitive histories, monographs, articles, and conference presentations. Recent publications concentrate on the first of the World War I commemorative series and the Vietnam War commemorative series. Topics currently being researched and written about include a history of Marines in the Frigate Navy and Marines in Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom. Historians also conduct history interviews of selected Marines whose experiences provide illuminating insight and

background into campaigns, operations, or separate combat actions that have potential for future use to set policy, standards, or doctrine. The historians also seek out career interviews of those Marines who shaped the setting of policy and doctrine or had a major, long-lasting effect on the Marine Corps.

Archives Branch

The Marine Corps Archives contain a wide range of records that include the official command chronologies collected from every command and unit in the Marine Corps. Many records are digitized and cataloged to make them available to

the widest audience possible and maximize their utility to the Marine Corps. The collection holds official documents and a large number of personal papers collections that reflect the long and varied history of the Marine Corps. The archive holds the university's curriculum files and has access to the student papers collection. To control growth and ensure that the most important items are preserved, the collections committee maintains rigorous standards and all collections decisions are subject to the approval of the president, Marine Corps University.

The branch holds extensive nonarchival internal working files covering areas of interest to the Marine Corps grouped by subject, biography, unit, and photographs. The files are used to answer questions from a wide patron base ranging from members of Congress, the Commandant's office, Marine units, and the general public. The branch researches and verifies command and unit participation in different exercises and campaigns to create accurate unit lineage and honors certificates and award

the appropriate associated campaign streamers. The commemorative naming program researches Marine Corps history to ensure that Marine Corps buildings, facilities, and streets are named for deserving Marines.

Field History Branch

The Field History Branch is composed of a Marine Corps Reserve Individual Mobilization Augmentee Detachment. Its members are trained field historians. During combat operations, field historians are deployed to collect oral history interviews from a wide variety of Marines—from those executing the plan to the planner—with the aim of capturing all operational aspects from all command levels. They also collect plans, orders, maps, overlays, photographs, and operational message traffic for inclusion in the archives, and they occasionally collect three-dimensional artifacts intended for the National Museum of the Marine Corps. During peacetime, the field historians interview Marines returning from deployments to capture the greatest number of perspectives on current operations.

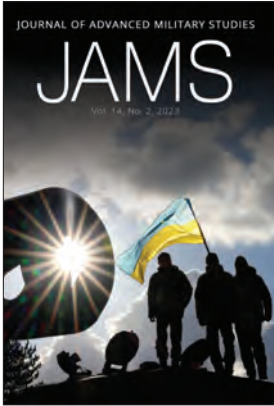

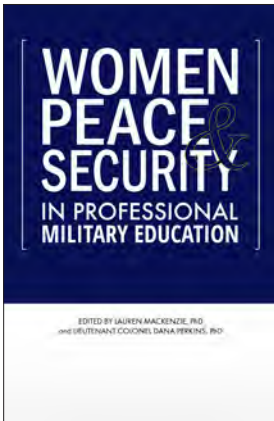
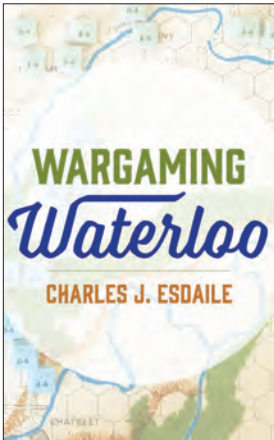

Mission Statement

Middle East Studies (MES) serves as the Marine Corps' center of expertise on the broader Middle East including South and Central Asia, parts of North and Sub-Saharan Africa, the Black Sea region, regions in the Muslim majority world with historical ties to the Middle East, and the Eastern Mediterranean. Founded in 2007 as an open-source professional military education (PME) resource on Iran for Marine Corps University (MCU) and fleet commanders, MES has expanded to align with evolving Marine Corps needs and requirements including examining Chinese and Russian policies and activities in these regions. The central goal of MES is to deepen the Marine Corps' understanding of these critical regions through professional military education and predeployment preparation as well as through MES faculty's teaching and research, events, in-house publications, including the bimonthly *MES Insights*, and outreach to other PME institutions, U.S. government agencies, U.S. military Services and Service institutions, nongovernmental organizations, international military partners, and academia more broadly. MES accomplishes this mission by:

1. Analyzing and assessing current events, regional trends, U.S. foreign policy decisions and strategies, and the cultural and historical complexities and interconnectivity of these regions;
2. Conducting and publishing academic research;
3. Developing curriculum and delivering classes, supporting student papers and master's theses, and offering lectures and discussions to MCU schools and other U.S. armed forces professional military education institutions and onboard U.S. naval vessels;
4. Hosting lectures and seminars onboard MCU;
5. Providing lectures and discussions to other U.S. government agencies, foreign governments and militaries, including NATO schools, and academia;
6. Representing MCU at seminars and professional forums related to MES's areas of responsibility by participation and professional engagement;
7. Building relationships and networks with Service PME institutions and the broader academic, intergovernmental, and international communities of knowledge and practice in Middle Eastern studies;
8. Developing and maintaining the academic expertise to ensure the Marine Corps has a flexible, proactive asset as the needs and requirements of the Corps in the region evolve; and
9. Hosting and mentoring MCU international fellows, external interns, and Marines assigned to MES.

Mission Statement

Preserving our Past, Influencing the Present, Inspiring the Future – The National Museum of the Marine Corps (NMMC) preserves and exhibits the material history of the U.S. Marine Corps; honors the commitment, accomplishments, and sacrifices of Marines; supports recruitment, training, education, and retention of Marines; and provides the public with universally accessible platforms for the exploration of Marine Corps history.

Purpose

The National Museum of the Marine Corps presents history as seen through the eyes of Marines. Currently spanning the country's history from our birth in 1775 through the end of the Vietnam War, the museum traces the path of our nation in turmoil and growth, showcasing the legacy of Marines' sacrifices during conflict and service in humanitarian efforts. With unique artifacts like the flag flown on Mount Suribachi on Iwo Jima, a Revolutionary War powder horn and aircraft that helped turn the tide of war, NMMC has something for everyone. NMMC is currently working on new exhibits and galleries covering the years from 1976 through the Global War on Terrorism. These new galleries will take visitors to Somalia, Beirut, Operations Desert Shield/Desert Storm, humanitarian efforts around the globe, and into Iraq and Afghanistan.

The museum preserves the history of the U.S. Marine Corps by collecting and preserving in perpetuity artifacts that reflect the history of the Corps; by interpreting these artifacts in exhibitions for the public; by contributing to educational programs; by conducting collections-based research; and by supporting the recruitment, education, and retention of Marine Corps personnel. Collections stewardship responsibilities are divided among five broad categories: arms and armor; uniforms and heraldry; aviation; art; and cultural and material history collections.

A robust education program reaches out to area classrooms and hosts more than 50,000 students on site annually. The distance learning program reaches students around the world. NMMC provides many professional military education opportunities for Marines and engages with the community to deliver programs related to the history of the Corps. Professional museum staff are assisted by more than 200 volunteers. These volunteers give life to the museum by interpreting the exhibits in a way that text panels and artifacts alone cannot do. Volunteers also provide support for the museum's education and restoration staff.

MARINE CORPS HERITAGE FOUNDATION

Mission Statement

The Marine Corps Heritage Foundation (MCHF), a nonprofit 501(c)3 organization, preserves and promulgates the history, traditions, and culture of the Marine Corps and educates all Americans in its virtues.

In 1999, the MCHF undertook a major project to better accomplish its mission—the capitalization, construction, and support of a National Museum of the Marine Corps and Heritage Center (NMMC) to be located at Quantico, Va. Working in partnership with the Marine Corps, and with generous philanthropic support from tens of thousands of individuals, numerous corporations, foundations, and state and local governments, the MCHF built this national treasure that opened on 10 November 2006. Since opening, the NMMC has quickly become a place for Marines to convene, share their experiences, celebrate their victories, and honor their fallen. The museum has welcomed more than 6.9 million visitors and has received rave reviews from Marines and civilians alike.

After the initial opening, the Marine Corps Heritage Foundation worked to add new classroom facilities, a combat art gallery, and a giant screen theater featuring our signature film, *We, The Marines*, to add to the visitor experience at the museum.

The foundation supports the Marine Corps' historical research and educational activities to include but not limited to the following items:

Annual Awards Program

Each year, the Marine Corps Heritage Foundation presents awards in 15 categories to both Marines and civilian community members, recognizing their exemplary work in advancing and preserving Marine Corps history. The categories include journalism, documentary, literature, screenplay, photography, and poetry. Winners receive a cash prize, a medalion, and a commemorative brick in Semper Fidelis Memorial Park.

The President's Own Marine Band Concerto Competition

Every year, the Marine Corps Heritage Foundation provides funding support to The President's Own Marine Band United States Marine Band concerto competition. The competition is a nationwide contest for high school musicians who vie for a \$2,500 prize sponsored by the foundation and the opportunity to perform with the legendary The President's Own Marine Band.

STUDENT ART COMPETITION

Each year, the Marine Corps Heritage Foundation sponsors the Student Art Competition held by the National Museum of the Marine Corps. Students in all grades (K–12) are given a military themed topic to create artwork around. The foundation provides the cash prizes for the winning students in support of the program.

NATIONAL HISTORY DAY COMPETITION SPONSORSHIP

Each year, the Marine Corps Heritage Foundation sponsors the National History Day Competition at both a regional and national level. NHD's core program is its competition in which students in grades 6–12 choose a topic and dive deeply into the past by conducting extensive research in libraries, archives, and museums. They then present their conclusions and evidence through papers, exhibits, performances, documentaries, or websites, moving through a series of contest levels where they are evaluated by professional historians and educators. MCHF provides a monetary award to the student whose entry best demonstrates an appreciation for Marine Corps history.

EDUCATION DEPARTMENT ASSOCIATED WITH THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF THE MARINE CORPS: TEACHER-IN-RESIDENCE

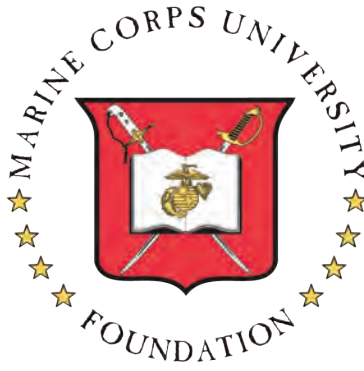
A highlight of the NMMC education program, this initiative recruits professional educators to serve as temporary NMMC staff members. The teacher-in-residence plans and coordinates student visits to maximize impact. These students tour the museum using gallery guides and then enter our classroom for further instruction. This initiative is another way for the museum to educate young people not only about the history of our nation, but also how the Marine Corps fits into it. Additionally, the teacher-in-residence conducts regular teacher workshops to enrich subject expertise; the workshops are in high demand by regional educators.

INTERNSHIPS

The Marine Corps Heritage Foundation facilitates internships with the National Museum of the Marine Corps and the History Division at Marine Corps University, offering stipends to participating college students. The museum and History Division offer opportunities for students to participate on a professional level in historical research and museum activities. The intent of the program is to give promising and talented students the opportunity to earn college credit while gaining meaningful work experience related to their major.

The foundation vigorously seeks financial support to provide continued leadership, strategic direction, and financial oversight in supporting and expanding programs at the National Museum of the Marine Corps and beyond its walls.

EDUCATIONAL TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENT

Purpose

The mission of the Educational Technology (ET) Department is to manage the incorporation and coordination of educational technology into the professional military education (PME) delivered by Marine Corps University (MCU) colleges and schools, as well as the training programs delivered by schools within the Training Command, Training and Education Command (TECOM), and those in support of training and education initiatives throughout the Marine Corps.

Operations

The ET Department is located within the College of Distance Education and Training (CDET) Technology Department. The ET Department provides functional support for the Marine Corps in three primary capacities: emerging technologies, MarineNet eLearning Ecosystem Requirements, and capabilities support.

The Emerging Technologies Branch researches, evaluates, and integrates emerging technologies and technical solutions in the field of distributed learning (DL) to support MCU's CDET. Identifying gaps and requirements for DL products and modeling and simulation, the team coordinates the collaboration of CDET's technology interests with the efforts of government, academia, commercial, and technology industries. This branch makes an effort to synchronize the requirements and subject matter expert (SME) participation with Headquarters Marine Corps agencies/directorates and other USMC commands for the MarineNet eLearning Ecosystem DL course designs, development, and delivery.

MarineNet eLearning Ecosystem requirements are facilitated through the Requirements Branch, which is responsible for the day-to-day operations and management of the MarineNet eLearning Ecosystem. This branch manages the overall function and system requirements that fulfill CDET customer needs. The team reviews and updates business processes and use cases for instructional technology (IT) application solutions. The MarineNet eLearning Ecosystem provides the distance learning platforms that host, test, and deliver vital electronic courses and products to the Marine Corps total force worldwide, in support of required Marine Corps Distance Education and Training programs. Offering a wide range of critical IT systems management and oversight, this branch provides support with content management, technical issues tracking, requirement identification, and coordination of internal and external support related to CDET's mission.

The Capabilities Support Branch builds on the support of the Requirements Branch by assisting the MCU and TECOM faculty, staff, and students in the integration and use of educational technology (ET) in their respective PME, training programs, and courses. The staff is equipped to solve problematic ET challenges in a variety of academic and technical areas. Leveraging adult learning theories and proven best practices of technology in academia, the capabilities branch facilitates the seamless integration of ET throughout resident colleges and schools, as well as the distance and eLearning programs by providing information and training.

FACULTY DEVELOPMENT AND OUTREACH

Purpose

Faculty Development

Ongoing faculty development is paramount for Marine Corps University faculty members. The purpose of faculty development is to support and adhere to the MCU mission statement, vision statement, and statement of purpose. Efforts are continuously made to heighten awareness of these three benchmarks of the university. Faculty development is carefully and strategically planned so that all participants have the opportunity to learn more about effective methods of teaching and learning in higher education.

Outreach

The MCU Outreach Program includes various areas of outreach to include: Academic Research Assistant, Volunteer, and Internship Program; Speakers Bureau; MCU Outreach Consortium; and collaborative working arrangements with outside agencies and organizations.

Academic Research Assistant, Volunteer, and Internship Program

The Academic Research Assistant, Internship, and Volunteer Program is designed to provide support to Marine Corps University faculty and staff. In general, faculty and staff, working with their educational program deans/directors, will be responsible for screening, selecting, evaluating, and coordinating all details regarding research assistants and interns. Volunteers may work with faculty at the discretion of the faculty member and dean/director. Applicants must be U.S. citizens and 18 years of age on or before the first day of reporting for duty.

Speakers Bureau

The purpose of MCU Speakers Bureau is to allow the Marine Corps University to share the expertise of its diverse faculty through community engagement by offering our faculty members the opportunity to provide their views over a broad range of informative topics during community events. In the interest of improving faculty outreach and brand messaging, faculty members are provided the opportunity to participate in speaking engagements outside of the university.

Outreach Consortium

As an outgrowth of the collaborative working relations effort, Marine Corps University Outreach developed a formal collaboration group to satisfy the *MCU Strategic Plan*, Goal 5, that addresses engagement opportunities. Specifically, the Outreach Consortium was developed to satisfy the following critical task: "Strengthen professional relationships with sister Service, joint, and civilian institutions to develop a shared understanding of each other's programs, discuss methods of instruction, and share best practices." There are a total of about 40 members of the MCU Outreach Consortium.

Operations

The MCU Office of Faculty Development

Provides guidance on the orientation and continued professional development of its faculty. A professional, well-educated faculty is key to the vitality of any educational institution. Therefore, MCU is committed to providing its students a high-quality educational experience, made possible through learning opportunities facilitated by faculty well versed in the curricula, Service policies and procedures, national policies, and educational philosophies.

Outreach: Academic Research Assistants and Interns

MCU research assistants (RAs) provide support on a variety of tasks and projects and are funded by the Marine Corps University Foundation (MCUF), pending available funding.

Speakers Bureau

The Speakers Bureau is a group of faculty members, with relevant expertise, who volunteer as potential speakers to educate and inform the public and sponsoring organizations about the Marine Corps, Marine Corps University and its PME continuum and educational programs, specific aspects of the PME curricula, and other military-related academic subjects (e.g., military history and leadership). The mission of the Marine Corps University Speakers Bureau is to offer speakers who are particularly educated and knowledgeable about certain subject matters or with experiences related to MCU's mission and to educate and inform the public and sponsoring organizations about the Marine Corps, Marine Corps University, and its PME continuum and educational programs. Specific topics include but are not limited to PME curricula and other military-related academic subjects (i.e., military history and leadership), issues in education, and critical thinking.

LEADERSHIP COMMUNICATION SKILLS CENTER

Purpose

The Leadership Communication Skills Center (LCSC) is an instructional communication support center for Marine Corps University (MCU) students, faculty, and staff. Its mission is to support leadership by strengthening individuals' written and oral communication skills. The LCSC accomplishes its mission by offering courses, classes, workshops, written reviews, and one-on-one instruction and assistance on communication projects, primarily to officers in the degree-granting schools. In AY 22–23, the LCSC faculty members offered approximately 120 hours of instruction in structured courses and workshops. They held 1,480 individual appointments with students, either in person or providing paper review.

Educational Philosophy

The responsibilities of leadership demand effective communication. By developing complex frameworks for analyzing communication situations as well as strong written and oral communication skills, individuals are able to clearly communicate ideas as they build relationships with their colleagues. LCSC faculty members teach communication as an integrated process that can help students acquire broader and deeper insights, skills, abilities, and attitudes about leadership communication practices.

Program Goals

- Teach studio courses early in the school year to strengthen students' approaches to their reading and writing assignments
- Teach Communication Prep Course and TOEFL Prep Course for international students
- Provide workshop classes on critical reading, academic and professional writing, and oral presentation skills
- Help students improve their communication processes and products by consulting with them individually about their work and their ideas
- Assist faculty with assessing student writing issues and offer strategies for providing feedback on student work
- Serve as the MCU point of contact for other PME graduate writing centers
- Present research on writing center theory and practice, as well as teaching and assessment of writing
- Provide accurate, up-to-date resources on written and oral communication to MCU students and faculty including the *Marine Corps University Communications Style Guide*
- Assist students and faculty as they prepare work for publication
