Provenance: The President Truman apology letter and other papers were donated to the Marine Corps Historical Branch by General Cates in the 1960s. His son, Clifton Cates, Jr. donated the rest of the Cates Papers in 1970. The papers were transferred from the Historical Branch to the Archives and Special Collections at Quantico in 1999.

Biographical Sketch

Clifton Bledsoe Cates was born on 31 August 1893 in Tiptonville, TN. He attended the Missouri Military Academy and later obtained his Bachelor of Laws degree from the University of Tennessee in 1916. On 13 June 1917, as a second lieutenant in the

reserves, he reported for active duty at the Marine Barracks, Port Royal, SC and left for France in January 1918.

With the 6th Marine Regiment in World War I, he fought at Bouresches and Belleau Wood, Soissons, St. Mihiel, and Blanc Mont. After participating in the occupation of Germany, 1stLt Cates returned to the United States and served in Washington, D.C., as a White House aide and Aide-de-Camp to the Commandant of the Marine Corps. He then served at San Francisco, California, as Aide-de-Camp to the Commanding General, Department of the Pacific, from October 1920 until June 1923, when he began a tour of sea duty as commander of the Marine Detachment aboard the USS *California*.

In 1928, Cates was named a member of the American Battle Monuments Commission at Washington. He served in that capacity until May 1929 then was ordered to Shanghai, China, where he rejoined the 4th Marines. Three years later he was detached from that regiment to return to Washington D.C. for study in the Army Industrial College.

Cates reported to Quantico in 1933 where he served with the 7th Marines and completed the Senior Course in the Marine Corps Schools. He returned again to Washington D.C. in September 1935 and was assigned to the War Plans Section of the Division of Operations and Training at Headquarters Marine Corps.

In August 1937, Cates went to Shanghai as a battalion commander with the 6th Marine Regiment and stay with them until March 1938 when he rejoined the 4th Marines. In May of 1942, Cates took command of the 1st Marines, which he led at Guadalcanal. After commanding the 1st Marines in the Guadalcanal-Tulagi landings and the capture and defense of Guadalcanal, he fought as commander of the 4th Marine Division in the Marianas operation, the Tinian campaign and the seizure of Iwo Jima.

Ordered back to the United States in December of 1945, Cates became President of the Marine Corps Equipment Board at Quantico, holding that position for six months before he was named Commanding General of the Marine Barracks, Quantico. He held that command until 1 January 1948, when he was advanced to the rank of general and sworn in as Commandant of the Marine Corps.

When Cates completed his four year term as Commandant, he reverted to the rank of Lieutenant General and began his second tour as Commandant of the Marine Corps Schools, Quantico. He retired on 30 June and was again promoted to general.

Clifton Cates died 4 June 1970 at the US Naval Hospital, Annapolis, Maryland, after a long illness. He was buried with full military honors on 8 June 1970 at Arlington National Cemetery.

Scope and Content Note

The Papers of Clifton B. Cates consist of materials relating mainly to his career with the Marine Corps from enlistment through his position as Commandant. The dates of the collection range from 1914-1969.

Included in this collection are letters describing his actions at Belleau Wood, Soissons, St. Michiels, Blanc Mont, and Argonne in addition to his leadership during World War II and later his testimony before the House Armed Services Committee on the military unification controversy following World War II. The majority of this correspondence is written to his mother, wife, children, and aunt and he goes into great detail on the activities of the Marines in various engagements.

Manuscripts included deal with the 96th Company, 2d Battalion, 6th Marines in World War I. Also included is a short study on the Japanese operations against Shanghai in 1932, written while Cates was a student at Command and Staff College, Marine Corps Schools, Quantico in 1935, and a manuscript derived from his diary entitled "My First at Guadalcanal".

Of note in the Cates papers are his World War I scrapbooks that include service records, photographs, and correspondence. Also of note is the letter of apology, written by President Harry S. Truman to Cates, for the President's use of the term "Navy's police force" in reference to the role of the Corps in the military forces of the United States.

The collection is arranged alphabetically by subject headings and chronologically within each series. For all of the subject headings, some were assigned by Cates and others were imposed by the processor. Series in this collection include addresses, correspondence, scrapbooks, service records, and photographs. The size of the collection is approximately 12 linear feet.

Series 1. Addresses, 1943-1954

Arrangement: ascending chronological by date given. This series consists of transcripts of addresses given by General Cates during and after World War II.

Series 2. Clippings, 1914-1961

Arrangement: alphabetical by subject heading. This series consists of newspaper clippings featuring General Cates or collected by him.

Series 3. Correspondence, 1917-1969

This series consists of correspondence produced and received by Cates. The series is arranged into two subseries: General and By Subject.

Series 3.1 Correspondence, General, 1917-1969

Arrangement: ascending chronological order by date written. This subseries consists of the correspondence of Clifton Cates. Incoming correspondence is interfiled with outgoing correspondence. These letters cover his service in World War I and World War II with letters home to his wife, children, mother, and aunt.

Series 3.2 Correspondence, Subject, 1918-1966

Arrangement: alphabetical by subject heading. This subseries consists of correspondence files arranged by subject headings. They cover correspondence from World War I into Cates' retirement. This series includes copies of the apology letter from President Truman.

Series 4. Publications, 1915-1966

Arrangement: alphabetical by title or subject heading. This series consists of publications collected by Cates. The bulk of the publications are about World War I and the actions of the 96th Company and some World War II histories.

Series 5. Scrapbooks, 1918-1942

Arrangement: alphabetical by subject heading. This series contains scrapbooks compiled by Cates. Of note is his World War I scrapbook that includes service records, photographs, and correspondence.

Series 6. Service Records, 1917-1957

This series consists of General Cates' service records dating from enlistment to retirement.

Series 7. Subject Files, 1919-1969

Arrangement: alphabetical by title. This series consists of miscellaneous files arranged by subject. Included are awards, Reports, and Congressional statements.

Series 8. Photographs

This series consists of many photographs of Cates, fellow Marines, and other notables. The series is arranged into two subseries: Alphabetical File and By Subject.

Series 8.1 Photographs, Alphabetical File

Arrangement: alphabetical by file title. This subseries consists of photographs that were maintained in a vertical file arranged by Cates according to subject title. Several of the photographs were duplicated in different alphabetical files. Many have been located based on the last name of the most notable person shown in the photograph.

Series 8.2 Photographs, Subject

Arrangement: alphabetically by subject heading. This subseries consists of photographs taken during World Wars I and II, scenes on Quantico, portraits, and notable events attended by Cates.
