Founded in 1989 by General Alfred M. Gray, MCU builds on a legacy dating back to World War I, emphasizing education for Marine leaders.








Enlisted PME Continuum

Marine Corps History Division

Collects, preserves, and presents historical information to inform decision-making, conduct research, and write Marine Corps history.

Archives

- 95% of records declassified - available to all researchers
- Holdings estimated 20M pages, >4M photographs, 30K maps.
 - >2M digitized record pages and photographs (90% of all Command Chronologies)

Field Historians

- Reserve Individual Mobilization Augmentees
- HD's "forward presence" with MEFs and operating units
- Collect "real time" records and oral histories, contribute written products

Histories

- research and write official operational and institutional history
- Multi-volume series; commemoratives, monographs, battle studies, etc.
- WWII "Red" Books, Vietnam
 Series, Quantico: Crossroads of the Marine Corp

Priorities

Digitize and develop remote accessibility of archival collection

Develop and execute collection plan for OIF, OEF, and current operations

Produce definitive history projects on OIF and OEF



National Museum of the Marine Corps

Mission: Preserving our past, influencing the present, inspiring the future

Background:

- Opened to the public 10 Nov 2006, additional galleries opened in 2010
- Accredited by American Alliance of Museums (AAM) in 2012; reaccredited in 2022
- Children's Gallery, Combat Art
 Gallery, Art Studio with Artist in
 Residence

Marine Corps Heritage Foundation raised funds to construct building; GS staff operate Museum

Final Phase construction began in 2015; Gallery 13 & 14 (post-Vietnam history) to open by 2025

Extra Important Information:

- Each year: ~500,000 visitors; 50,000+ students on site; 8,300+ distance learning students; 250,000 fans/followers on six social media platforms; 22,500+ web site visitors/month; 20+ regular PME programs and growing
- Professional curatorial, exhibits, collections, visitor services, education, public affairs, facilities, fiscal, and admin staff (58 GS billets); Marine detachment (9); 300+ volunteers; security, maintenance, housekeeping, other contractors; 20+ special assistants; two teachers in residence; 10 summer interns
