

GUIDELINES FOR REVIEWERS

Thank you for agreeing to review for Marine Corps University Press. Your review should be no less than <u>750</u> words in length. If writing a longer, multi-title essay, the word count should start at about 1,250 and can be footnoted. Our heading form is as follows:

Containment in the Middle East. By Ehud Eilam. (Lincoln: Potomac Books, University of Nebraska Press, 2019. Pp. 216. \$29.95 hardcover and e-book.)

Reviews should be double-spaced and typed in 12-point Times New Roman. If possible, save your review as a Microsoft Word file (*.doc or *.docx) and submit it via e-mail attachment to mcu_press@usmcu.edu.

Please consider the following points as you frame the review:

- Provide a brief summary of the scope, purpose, and content of the book. Explain its significance and context. Include an evaluation of the author's use of sources, organization and presentation of material, and achievement of overall purpose.
- Be honest but fair in your evaluation. Your critique may be favorable or unfavorable, but in all cases avoid personalities, express criticism in respectful terms, and provide a balanced account of the book's content without irrelevant digressions.
- This is an apolitical university press and a U.S. government publisher, so while some of the subject matter addressed in books under review might be political in nature, avoid expressing personal political opinions in your review.
- Do not list typographical or other minor errors unless they significantly impair the value of the book.
- Provide page numbers for all quoted passages and phrases. If you cite other works in the review, supply the year published for books and full citations for articles. Integrate the citations into the text, as we do not footnote standard single-title reviews.
- After your name at the close of the review, please provide a brief identification of yourself.
 Here is an example: Jane A. Doe, lieutenant colonel, USMC (ret.), teaches military history at
 Marine Corps University, Quantico, Virginia. She is author of Strategy across History (2011)
 and is currently researching U.S. strategy in the Gulf War.
